
EMERGENCY PREP WORKSHOPS RETURN IN MARCH

Residents Supporting Community

With a hilltop park and \$5 ferry rides, Yerba Buena Island could soon be a destination

People heading west on the Bay Bridge in recent months have seen an unprecedented sight: a multistory condominium building wrapped in scaffolding, just yards away from where the bridge's eastern span touches down on Yerba Buena Island.

Now the scaffolding is coming down — but that only marks the beginning of a paradigm-shifting remake of a rocky outcrop that until 1931 was named Goat Island. Within a year, a hilltop park could be the Bay Area's newest scenic destination, above craggy slopes that will begin to be inhabited by people willing and able to spend upward of \$4 million on spacious modern homes with drop-dead views.

"You're going to see the unveiling of an area that people hadn't explored before," said Tim Slattery, a partner at the architecture firm Hart Howerton. "It's a complex jigsaw puzzle, but things are starting to come together."

Slattery and his firm have been working since 2016 on the architecture and layout of buildings on the slopes of a small island that could only be reached by boats before the completion of the Bay Bridge in


1936. Not long after that it was joined by Treasure Island, a 403-acre plateau summoned from the bay to serve as the home of the Golden Gate International Exposition that opened in 1939.

The idea back then was to turn Treasure Island into San Francisco's municipal airport. Instead, the U.S. Navy took control of both islands during World War II for defense purposes, not closing them until the 1990s.

The current transition was approved in 2011 by the Board of Supervisors and has been in the works since 2003, when tentative development rights were awarded to a team that now includes Lennar Corp., Stockbridge Capital Group and Wilson Meany. The goal is a neighborhood like none in the region — with a 300-foot-wide shoreline park facing the Embarcadero and more than 8,000 housing units. Many of these will be clustered near a ferry terminal that is scheduled to open on Jan. 15, featuring a 49-seat vessel and \$5 one-way fares.

Treasure Island's makeover is by far the most dramatic. It has also stirred controversies, raising questions such as the adequacy of the cleanup of the former base and the wisdom of pursuing such an ambitious development as sea level rise looms. But in the year to come, Yerba Buena Island is where the grand plans will come into focus first.

That's particularly obvious with the project nearing completion alongside the Bay Bridge — the Bristol, a six-story building that will hold 124 of the island's 266 condominiums.



Right now, the site is an incongruous mash-up of future and past; large bags holding pink fiberglass insulation are stacked in the tall entrance lobby alongside a fireplace clad in pale Tennessee marble. Thick glass floor-to-ceiling windows — the better to muffle Bay Bridge noise — have their views obscured by scaffolding. The spacious central courtyard isn't yet landscaped, except for a single statuesque magnolia tree lowered into place before the structure around it went up.

The final pieces should be in place by this spring, when residents begin to move into a building where the least expensive market-rate unit, a studio, will be priced above \$800,000.

"We're selling units. I feel very good about where we are," said Chris Meany of Wilson Meany when asked how buyers are responding to a setting with views that offer, not the San Francisco skyline, but Emeryville's mud flats and the Oakland hills. "Though like every aspect of life, we'd be doing better without the pandemic."


The scourge of COVID-19 is hinted at in the island's marketing book, with its listing of features that includes "premium air quality in every home" via high-grade filters. Elsewhere, the pitch is an emphasis of exquisitely appointed flats and townhouses amid 72 acres of open space and five miles of trails. The slogan: "San Francisco as it was meant to be lived."

For early residents, that life won't include the more urban scale and retail features envisioned on Treasure Island, where most of the construction still involves putting infrastructure in place. But for Meany, starting on the former Goat Island and working north makes perfect sense.

"One thing Yerba Buena Island does is allow us to create, quickly, a whole environment," he explained. "The notion of an intimate community."

Many of the basics already are in place, such as the three new water tanks that will serve both islands and have a 5.3 million cubic gallon capacity. The main roadways are complete. The causeway between the two islands has been rebuilt.

Just west of the Bristol, though not visible from the Bay Bridge, foundations are in for the first 31 ultralux townhouses and flats. Above them, the terrain is being shaped for the first half of a 6-acre hilltop park designed by noted Oakland landscape architect Walter Hood. Slightly downhill will be a boulder-studded dog park that Meany boasts will have a three-bridge view.

If current schedules hold, all this should be finished within 12 months. By then, the first new housing on Treasure Island also will have opened — a six-story complex for formerly homeless veterans — and the waterfront park should be under construction.

That project, which includes 775 housing units in the first phase alone, easily could stretch out for a decade or more. The remake of Yerba Buena Island is likely to be completed long before that, discreet though most of it might be.

"We're trying to create an experience out there," Slattery said. "It will be the one place in the bay where you can take in the entire region."

Season of Sharing funds help food banks still facing increased need due to the pandemic

"This food bank saved me from a lot of sorrows," Michael Bartell said, waving and chatting with people who came to pick up groceries from the San Francisco-Marin Food Bank pop-up pantry on a sunny afternoon at Treasure Island.

Once homeless, Bartell — a veteran who lives on Treasure Island and works with the organization Swords to Plowshares — has been volunteering with SF-Marin Food Bank's outpost on the island for six years. But he's also a recipient of the help — food he says helped him become healthier as he came out of homelessness.

"It really is a blessing," he said.

The SF-Marin Food Bank is one of several food banks that received funding from the Chronicle's Season of Sharing Fund this year, 15% of which goes to food banks across the nine Bay Area counties. Through funds raised from the 2020-2021 campaign, the Season of Sharing Fund distributed \$2,360,000 to Bay Area food banks — equivalent to 4,956,000 meals.

"Every dollar counts. Every dollar means two meals," said Tanis Crosby, executive director of the SF-Marin Food Bank. "Funds from Season of Sharing make those meals possible."

At the beginning of <u>the pandemic</u>, food banks were thrust into the spotlight, as widespread layoffs and shutdowns <u>sent need skyrocketing</u>. While no longer as obvious, the increased need as a result of the pandemic <u>persists</u>.

"Although our numbers have decreased, we're still 69% above what we were pre-pandemic," said David Goodman, chief operating officer of Redwood Empire Food Bank, which also receives Season of Sharing funds. "And we're not unique."

Crosby said that SF-Marin is in a similar boat — the bank now distributes one million meals to more than 50,000 households every week, compared to 32,000 households every week before the pandemic. In a recent survey of over 7,000 food bank participants, 81% said that they had yet to recover from pandemic-related economic woes.

According to the <u>California Association of Food Banks</u>, as many as one in five Californians struggles with food insecurity, which means they do not always know where their food will come from.

Food banks function like safety nets for communities, Goodman said. That means they need to be there and ready for demand spikes in unexpected disasters like fires, floods or global pandemics.

"When I think about the Season of Sharing support, I think about the fact they essentially are giving us that support in advance of what might be happening tomorrow or the next day or the next day," he said. "And they allow us to sort of prepare with confidence and hoist that net up and catch anybody, so we're ready when people fall."

James Veneradle, who once owned a contracting company in Colorado as well as a ranch, didn't think he'd ever end up leaning on a food bank for support. But since moving to the Bay Area in the 1990s, he's found it very hard to save money.

Now, all he has to lean on is \$1,300 a month he gets from Social Security. Every week, he spends about \$20 to \$40 on groceries, he said, buying whatever's on sale at the supermarket and coming to the food bank once a week to supplement that.

"If it wasn't for this food bank, there'd be times there'd be nothing in the house," he said. Veneradle said the assistance he gets from the pantry makes him want to give back as well — he tries to volunteer with the food bank when he can and often brings extra food to the family, a single mother and three kids, who live across the street from him.

He's also thankful for people like Bartell — the two are friends — who make the place welcoming. Bartell said he hates to see people "down in the dumps" when they come to the pantry, so he tries to lift everyone up, telling jokes, remembering names and details about their life, or just simply sharing a smile.

"I try to make everything fun," he said. "I don't want no sorrow or drama in my lifetime anymore. I've had enough of that."

Like the donations, those smiles and volunteer hours go a long way.

"It really does take a community to provide food for all, and every person who has been part of this can feel a huge sense of pride," Crosby said. Bartell agrees.

"These people here have made a world of difference in my life," he said. "If it wasn't for this food bank, God only knows where I'd be."

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
