#### **David Baker Architects completes tallest building in San Francisco's Treasure Island development**

Local studio David Baker Architects has completed a tower with a "folded" facade on Treasure Island, a man-made island in San Francisco that is being converted into a residential neighbourhood.

The 22-storey residential building has a long two-tiered podium that stretches across the seaside site, with the tower portion pushed to the furthest side of the site and one side stretching further down to meet the rooftop of the lower podium.

The ground floor of the building is pushed back slightly from the street with high expanses of glass, while the higher levels of the podium were clad in brick.

David Baker Architects (DBA) clad the tower portion in white aluminium panels and glazed tiles, with an envelope DBA principal Pedram Farashbandi described as "folded" and informed by the classic bay windows of San Francisco.

A revised proposal aimed at turbocharging the development of San Francisco's Treasure Island would increase the number of housing units planned for the fast-growing neighborhood by as much 35%, from 8,000 homes to as many as 10,800.

Some 15 years after the Treasure Island redevelopment plan was approved, an amended vision for the island seeks to capitalize on the momentum the neighborhood has seen over the last five years with its eight new waterfront parks, 1,000 new housing units and a ferry terminal from which commuters can get downtown in 10 minutes.

Treasure Island Community Development Managing Partner Chris Meany said the increased units would be rental and many would be added in the next phase of building, some of which could start construction this year. The additional units would adhere to Treasure Island's 27.2% affordability requirement and would be built within the planned footprint of the project's master plan.

This required infrastructure improvements, upgrades and slope failure repair to the road—work that was necessary after heavy precipitation in fall 2021. The heavily eroded slope had almost a sheer vertical dropoff, was 120 feet long and consisted of silty, sandy soil.

### Sleepless in San Francisco: Data shows city’s most sleep-deprived neighborhoods

How do San Francisco’s wealthiest people sleep at night? Very well indeed.

According to new data published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as part of its PLACES project, which provides health data for communities, parts of the city with the best snoozing habits correlate with the highest incomes. By comparison, people living in Bayview-Hunters Point, Treasure Island, and other neighborhoods with some of the city’s lowest household incomes are not getting enough sleep....

Treasure Island and Bayview-Hunters Point stand out as the most sleep-deprived areas of San Francisco for adults, with 40.5% and 39.1%, respectively, reporting less-than-optimal sleep. Residents of those neighborhoods are also the city's lowest earners. Households in Bayview-Hunters Point brought in approximately \$101,566 in 2023, the most recent figure available, while those in Treasure Island earned \$91,750. Treasure Island's share of bad sleepers rose 4.6 percentage points from 2020 to 2022.

### **San Francisco firefighters contain fire at vacant building**

Firefighters were able to contain a fire at a vacant building in San Francisco Saturday, according to authorities.

The department said firefighters contained a one-alarm structure fire in the 1200 block of Northpoint in Treasure Island. The fire was at an unoccupied, warehouse-style facility, officials report.

The fire department said nobody was hurt and nobody was displaced due to the incident, which is under investigation.
