Pelosi Announces San Francisco Receives More Than \$12 Million for Community Projects in FY26 Government Funding Package

Washington, D.C. – Speaker Emerita Nancy Pelosi announced that more than \$12 million in federal funding is headed to San Francisco to support critical community, public safety, transportation, housing, workforce and environmental projects across the city. These investments were secured through Fiscal Year 2026 Community Project Funding and were included in the government funding package signed into law.

“The new federal funding designated for community-driven projects across San Francisco is great news for our city,” said Speaker Emerita Nancy Pelosi. “I was proud to secure these investments which underscore the Democrats’ commitment to fighting for working families, even in a Republican Majority. From strengthening public safety and homelessness services to expanding workforce training,

supporting veterans, advancing scientific research, and improving transit accessibility, this funding will deliver real results for San Franciscans.”

South Treasure Island Plunged Into Darkness As SFPUC Rushes To Fix Power Outage

The south end of Treasure Island went dark today after a power outage cut electricity to homes and small businesses, leaving a big chunk of the neighborhood without lights or internet. According to the city's emergency alert, the blackout hit areas around Avenues D, H, I and M, plus stretches of 4th and 9th streets, as crews moved in to restore service and figure out what went wrong.

The San Francisco Department of Emergency Management issued an AlertSF post on X stating that the outage hit the south end of Treasure Island and that the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission was “working to restore power,” according to the department. The alert listed DOL, Avenues D, H, I and M, plus 4th and 9th streets, Chinook Court, Flounder Court and Sturgeon Street among the impacted blocks. Officials urged residents to steer clear of any downed wires and to keep an eye on official channels for updates.

Treasure Island development director to retire after 12 years

Robert Beck, director of the Treasure Island Development Authority, will retire Sunday after more than a decade leading the redevelopment of Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island, City Administrator Carmen Chu announced.

Beck has served as TIDA director since 2013, overseeing major infrastructure projects, housing construction, transit connections, and the creation of parks and public spaces as the former naval base is transformed into a mixed-use community, a press release issued Friday noted.

During his tenure, the city gained ownership of two-thirds of Treasure Island and completed 974 housing units, including 297 affordable homes.

City officials said Beck also helped deliver key infrastructure, including new water storage reservoirs, an electrical switchyard, a ferry terminal, and a wastewater treatment facility.

Plans for the islands call for more than 7,000 additional housing units and expanded parkland in the coming years.

Beck began his career with the City and County of San Francisco in 1988 and held senior roles at Public Works, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, and the Transbay Joint Powers Authority before taking on the Treasure Island assignment.

Jamie Querubin, TIDA's deputy director, will serve as acting director while the city conducts a search for Beck's successor.
