New residents pour into Treasure Island as San Francisco's newest waterfront neighborhoods take shape

More than a thousand residents have move into new homes on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island as San Francisco's newest waterfront neighborhoods reach new milestones.

Treasure Island Boom: 1,000 New Neighbors Flood San Francisco's Bayfront Oasis

More than 1,000 people have now settled into newly completed homes on Treasure Island and neighboring Yerba Buena Island, a major milestone in the long-running effort to turn the former naval base into San Francisco's newest waterfront neighborhood. The recent wave of move-ins spans rentals, townhomes and flats that opened over the past year, landing just as new parks, promenades and a daily ferry make the islands feel more like a place to live than a construction site. Early residents and planners say the moment marks a clear shift from years of groundwork and utilities into actual neighborhood life.

As reported by the San Francisco Business Times, more than 1,000 people have taken possession of units across several newly completed buildings on both Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island. Developers say the new residents include households moving into recently finished rental towers as well as for-sale buildings that opened this year, a turnover they hoped would seed the islands' first sizable residential community. The surge follows years of infrastructure upgrades and park construction that were designed to prepare the area for full-time residents.

Mayor Lurie Announces Appointments Of Civic Leaders To City Institutions

Mayor Daniel Lurie today announced appointments and reappointments to San Francisco committees and commissions. The mayor appointed Channie Barker and Aditya Lakshminarayan to the Veterans' Affair Commission, Patrick Boileau to the Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee, Robyn Sue Fisher and Fernay McPherson to the Small Business Commission, Gavin Jay to the Southeast Community Facility Commission, Emily Mathis to the Mayor's Disability Council, Jonathan Moscone to the Film Commission, Gabriela Ortega to the Free City College Oversight Committee, James Pappas to the Office of Community Investment and Infrastructure Oversight Board, Derrick Tyler to the Mission Bay Transportation Improvement Fund Advisory Council, and Katie Zheng to the San Francisco Public Utilities Commissions (SFPUC) Citizen Advisory Committee.

Mayor Lurie also reappointed Joseph Baba to the San Francisco Veterans Affairs Commission and Linda Fadeke Richardson, Jeanette Howard, and Timothy Reyff to the Treasure Island Development Authority (TIDA) Board of Directors.

Jeanette Howard is a conservation scientist and organizational leader with more than two decades of experience at The Nature Conservancy. She has led statewide initiatives focused on land stewardship, climate resilience, and biodiversity, and currently co-chairs the California Biodiversity Network. Her expertise in ecological planning, environmental remediation, and climate adaptation directly supports the long-term sustainability challenges facing Treasure Island development, including sea-level rise and land reuse planning.

Timothy Reyff is a San Francisco trades professional and current TIDA board member with more than a decade of experience in construction and union labor leadership. He began his career in the Northern California Drywall Lathing Apprenticeship program and currently serves as a field representative with the North Coast States Carpenters Union. He brings hands-on expertise in workforce development, labor relations, and construction operations. Since joining the TIDA board in 2023, he has contributed to planning and relationship development supporting the Treasure Island redevelopment process.

Mission Resident to Complete Four-Year Goal to Walk Every Street in SF

A local gay resident, who's been walking every street in San Francisco for the past four years plans to finish his last stretch along Washington Street over Pride Weekend.

Mission District resident Walter Parenteau will complete a four-year project to walk every street, alley, and staircase in San Francisco Saturday — including Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island — in celebration of Pride Weekend, according to the Bay Area Reporter. The last leg of Parenteau's trek will begin at Sue Bierman Park at Washington and Drumm streets, joined by friends and others who have followed his years-long effort.

The project gradually took shape out of his daily life in the city, reportedly beginning as routine walks between the Mission and Parenteau's job at St. Anthony's Foundation in the Tenderloin, where he leads the "Hygiene Hub," offering showers and laundry services. Over time, those commute routes expanded into planned excursions, eventually becoming a deliberate effort to cover the entire street grid.

Former SF Supportive Housing Case Manager Accused of Sexually Abusing Employees, Residents

Several women say local nonprofit HomeRise ignored complaints spanning at least two years while a high-profile case manager repeatedly harassed and sexually assaulted them at its supportive housing complexes in SoMa and on Treasure Island.

As the Chronicle reports, former residents and employees allege that Satesh Prasad — a formerly incarcerated case manager known as “Sal” who became something of a local success story after avoiding deportation and landing a job with HomeRise — routinely sexually harassed, propositioned, and in some cases sexually assaulted residents and co-workers while working at the nonprofit.

Prasad had previously drawn widespread local media attention after immigration authorities detained him upon his release from prison in 2021 and attempted to deport him to Fiji, where he had not lived since childhood. The bisexual former inmate became a high-profile cause in San Francisco and was featured by numerous Bay Area media outlets before ultimately winning his fight to remain in the US.

Satesh Prasad was poised for an inspirational second act.

Raised in gang culture in Modesto and sentenced to life for murder in his early 20s, he was granted parole in 2021, when he was almost 50. He described himself as a changed man, committed to helping other vulnerable people. Immigration agents jeopardized that mission when they detained him on the day of his release and tried to send him to his native Fiji, a country he had left at age 6.

Prasad, known as “Sal,” became a cause célèbre in San Francisco, ultimately dodging deportation and securing a job at the nonprofit HomeRise. There, as a case manager, he was tasked with helping homeless people find stability through supportive housing. A short documentary about his redemption screened in April at an international film festival.

SF celebrates FIFA World Cup with waterfront festival

A portion of San Francisco’s waterfront is coming alive over the next six weeks with concerts, watch parties and other fun events as part of a celebration for this summer’s FIFA World Cup.

Gold Bar Distillery, a whiskey producer and tasting room on Treasure Island, will bring residents and visitors to the man-made artificial island for Celebration of Nations, an event that is screening 13 of the summer soccer tournament’s matches. It will also offer DJ sets with international artists, hands-on cocktail-making demonstrations and custom souvenirs.

Running through July 19, the event will allow Bay Area patrons to experience the once-in-a-generation event while simultaneously taking in sweeping views of San Francisco Bay and The City’s skyline.

Bar employees said the celebration is tapping into the Bay Area’s status as a host region and bringing a sense of community to a side of San Francisco that residents may not always frequent.

Treasure Island Community Development Co-CEO Chris Meany said Treasure Island “has always been about bringing people together.”
