Urgent Request to Keep the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee

Dear Commission Streamlining Task Force Members,

I am writing in response to your recommendation to eliminate the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee and **strongly urge you to reconsider keeping it as is.**

The San Francisco SDDTAC is a nationally recognized, **legislatively established body** created through the **will of San Francisco voters** to ensure that revenues from the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax (SDDT) are recommended to be **allocated transparently**, **equitably**, **and effectively** to advance health equity. The Committee consists of sixteen appointed members, including subject matter experts, community and health equity representatives, and City department staff—each serving a defined role to uphold public and community accountability and voter intent.

San Francisco's implementation of the SDDT and the SDDTAC's transparent, data-driven, and community-informed budget recommendations have made it a model for other jurisdictions across the country. The SDDTAC's recommendations to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors directly support local efforts to reduce sugary drink consumption, expand access to clean drinking water, improve oral health, and promote healthy eating and active living—all priorities central to the City's public health mission.

Narrow emphasis on the consumption of sugary drinks by youth (youth & parent representative)	The SDDTAC's mandate is health equity for all, guided by data and informed by community. While youth are heavily targeted by beverage marketing, the SDDTAC's work prioritizes five populations: low-income Black/African American, Latinx, Asian, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native communities.

Furthermore, the SDDTAC's creation by voter-approved ordinance precludes its dissolution or absorption without legislative action.

SDDTAC Achievements and Accomplishments

- Serves as a national model for soda tax advisory bodies
- Facilitates cross-sector collaboration across local community-based organizations, research/medical institutions, City departments, and the public.

- Since 2018, the SDDTAC has produced annual evaluation reports and funding recommendations to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors grounded in data and evidence and community priorities as legislatively charged.
- Provides transparent and continuous community engagement through public comment, outreach, and deliberate sessions
- Provides budget recommendations that support the overall decrease in the consumption of sugary drinks through funded initiatives that have directly contributed to:
 - Emergency food access
 - Healthy retail with local business owners
 - Nutrition education
 - o Oral health screenings and sealants for children
 - Workforce development and job training
 - Community health worker cohorts working with priority populations most targeted by the beverage industry
 - REFRESH kitchens for SFUSD meals with fresh and mostly local ingredients
 - Water access and education at schools and public parks/sites

The **SDDTAC** was **intentionally created and approved by voters** to represent community voices and ensure accountability in the use of the SDDT. To dismantle or absorb it into another body would **erode public trust, undermine voter intent, and weaken San Francisco's leadership in public health innovation**.

The SDDTAC is a **bridge for underrepresented communities**, embedding bi-directional feedback between residents and policymakers. Each member carries the weight of the communities they represent. Its elimination would not "streamline" government—it would **silence critical community oversight** and **diminish transparency**.

We strongly urge the Commission Streamlining Task Force to keep the SDDTAC in full and honor the will of San Francisco voters by protecting this advisory committee in its unique role, broad impact, and community-centered approach are vital to advancing health equity and public health in San Francisco. The SDDTAC's work embodies transparency, equity, and the City's longstanding commitment to community-driven health policy.
