



Household Income

- For a family of four, 200% of the FPL is \$64,000
- Based on self-sufficiency studies, a family of four in SF requires an annual income of greater than \$142,000 to meet all their needs

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

Leading Causes of Death by Race/Ethnicity


Age-Adjusted Rates per 100,000 Residents, San Francisco, 2019-2021



RESILIENCE AMIDST CRISIS

 COVID-19 Response

- Focused on equitable care, vaccination, testing, and treatments
- **34%** of all SF residents were **up-to-date** with COVID-19 vaccinations as of Aug 9, 2024, compared to only 15% of all California residents

Mpox Vaccinations

- Mpox is an infectious disease that is treatable and can be prevented by vaccination
- San Francisco had the **highest rate** of mpox vaccinations in California





PERSISTENT CHALLENGES

Mental Health

- Mental health is a concern across all age groups
- Serious psychological distress is based on the **number and frequency** of mental health symptoms such as **hopelessness** or **depression** reported within the past year

Serious Psychological Distress for Adults in SF, 2018-2022


PERSISTENT CHALLENGES



Drug-Related Deaths

- Drug-related deaths have been increasing since 2018
- 73% of opioid deaths in SF were due to fentanyl
- Other overdose deaths included opioids, cocaine/crack, and methamphetamine


Nutrition-Sensitive Conditions



Obesity, Diabetes, Heart Disease

- Hospitalizations due to diabetes, hypertension, or heart disease:
 - **9x higher** for Pacific Islander residents
 - **~4x higher** for Black/African American residents
- Hospitalizations due to heart failure:
 - Highest among residents of Treasure Island and Bayview Hunter's Point

(comparing to the citywide average from 2017 to 2021)
