Executive Summary

San Francisco Ordinance 077-22 requires general acute care hospitals and hospital-based skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) in the city to annually report data regarding (1) patients transferred to a health facility outside of the city to receive skilled nursing or subacute skilled nursing care, and (2) patients who qualify for skilled nursing or subacute skilled nursing care but remain in an acute care hospital or hospital-based skilled nursing facility. This is the fourth report in compliance with Ordinance 077-22 and provides an analysis of 2025 calendar year data provided by reporting health facilities.

In San Francisco, nine health facilities reported data in compliance with Ordinance 077-22: seven acute care hospitals and two long-term care facilities. **Acknowledging data limitations**, the summary findings of the 2025 report are as follows:

SNF & Subacute SNF Transfer Volume

- Health facilities reported more than 8,000 discharges to skilled nursing facilities (8% increase from 2024 to 2025). San Francisco residents represented more than 5,400 discharges to SNFs.
- There were fewer than 50 reported transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities, which aligns with findings from the previous report. Approximately 54% of 2025 subacute transfers involved individuals who were not residents of San Francisco.

SNF & Subacute SNF Transfer Placement

- 81% of all San Francisco resident transfers were placed in SNFs located in the city (6% increase from 2024 to 2025).
- Approximately 97% of San Francisco residents transferred to a SNF were placed within 30 miles of the reporting health facility (2% increase from 2024 to 2025).
- More than 80% of San Francisco residents transferred to an out-of-county subacute skilled nursing facility were placed within 30 miles of the reporting health facility.

Characteristics of SNF & Subacute SNF Transfer Population

- The hospital population transferred to a SNF (in-county and out-of-county) are primarily over the age of 65, are racially and ethnically diverse, and most encounters have permanent housing. These findings are consistent with prior reports.
- As reported in prior years, Medicare is the most common payor amongst individuals transferred to a skilled nursing facility and amongst encounters transferred to a subacute facility.
- Hospital encounters with dual eligibility (Medi-Medi) accounted for a larger share of transfers to in-county skilled nursing facilities (19.6% of transfers) compared to out-of-county transfers (8.7% of transfers).

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Glossary

Skilled Nursing Care is nursing or therapy care for patients who are medically stable and have a need that must be performed by skilled, licensed professionals daily. Skilled nursing care can be provided in either of the following types of facilities:

- **Freestanding Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF)** is a stand-alone facility licensed as a SNF.
- **Distinct Part (DP/SNF)** are beds a part of a larger institution and designated for skilled nursing. Typically, DP/SNF beds are located within a hospital in a separate wing, floor, building, or ward.

Subacute Skilled Nursing Care¹ is a level of care needed by a patient who doesn't require hospital acute care, but who requires more intensive licensed skilled nursing care than is provided to most patients in a skilled nursing facility. Subacute patients require special medical equipment, supplies and treatments such as ventilators, tracheostomies, total parenteral nutrition, tube feeding, and complex wound management care. To qualify for subacute care, patients must need one of the following:

- Tracheostomy care with continuous mechanical ventilation for at least 50 percent of the day
- Tracheostomy care with suctioning and room air mist or oxygen as needed, and one of the six treatment procedures listed below
- Administration of any three of the six treatment procedures listed below:
 1. Total parenteral nutrition
 2. Inpatient physical, occupational, and/or speech therapy, at least two hours per day, five days per week
 3. Tube feeding (nasogastric or gastrostomy)
 4. Inhalation therapy treatments every shift and a minimum of four times per 24-hour period
 5. Intravenous therapy involving:
 - the continuous administration of a therapeutic agent, or
 - the need for hydration, or
 - frequent intermittent intravenous drug administration via a peripheral and/or central line (for example, with Heparin lock)
 6. Debridement, packing and medicated irrigation with or without whirlpool treatment.

Hospital Discharge (Transfer) is the process of ending a patient's inpatient stay to transition home or to another care setting (including a skilled nursing facility). The word "transfer" is used synonymously with "discharge" throughout the report.

Dual Eligible patients are those who qualify for both Medicare and Medi-Cal. For skilled care, Medicare covers the first 100 days of medically necessary SNF care (100% for the first 20 days, and days 21-100 with co-payment). Medi-Cal covers extended long-term custodial care. These patients may also be referred to as Medi-Medi throughout the report.

Introduction

In 2022, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors passed [Ordinance 077-22](#). The Ordinance requires hospitals in the city to annually report to the Department of Public Health (DPH) the number of, and certain demographic information regarding:

1. patients transferred to a health facility outside of the city to receive skilled nursing care or subacute skilled nursing care, and
2. patients who qualify for skilled nursing care or subacute skilled nursing care but are not transferred to a health facility outside of the city.

The goal of the ordinance is to understand San Francisco's need for skilled nursing and subacute skilled nursing beds by collecting data on the population who are transferred from hospitals in the city to the appropriate level of care or remain in an acute care bed, waiting for a skilled nursing or subacute skilled nursing bed.

Reporting Health Facilities

The Ordinance applies to general acute care hospitals or hospital-based skilled nursing facilities, as defined by Section 1250 of the California Health and Safety Code, located in San Francisco. Collectively referred to as "reporting health facilities or hospitals" throughout the report. The following facilities are required to report:

- California Pacific Medical Center (CPMC) – Van Ness, Mission Bernal, Davies
- Chinese Hospital
- Kaiser Foundation Hospital, San Francisco
- Kentfield Hospital San Francisco
- University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) – Mount Zion, Mission Bay, Parnassus
- UCSF Health – Hyde, Stanyan
- Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center (ZSFG)
- Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center (LHH)
- Jewish Home and Rehab Center

The Ordinance does not apply to freestanding skilled nursing facilities.

Data Report Requirements

Reporting Health Facilities are required to annually submit a data report to DPH by January 31st for the preceding calendar year. Data report requirements can be found in Appendix A. DPH issues guidelines and a template data collection report for use by hospitals.

Data Notes

Data reported by hospitals and present throughout the report is aggregated encounter data and has not been de-duplicated. To protect patient privacy, values that are potentially identifiable have been suppressed. Specifically:

- Data values of less than ten (i.e., 1-9) are suppressed as indicated by the text "<10".
- For demographic categories, values of ten or greater may be suppressed to mask an adjacent value that is less than ten in the same sub-category. Those values are indicated by the text ">10".

The baseline year of 2023 is used for data comparison as it was the first year of data when reporting health facilities provided both in-county and out-of-county transfers.

Skilled Nursing Transfers

All reporting hospitals report the aggregate number of hospital encounters transferred to skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) based on patient discharge records.² Except UCSF, most 2025 hospital encounters discharged to a SNF were San Francisco residents. Table 1 (next page) provides the total number of transfers/discharges to SNFs by reporting health facility.

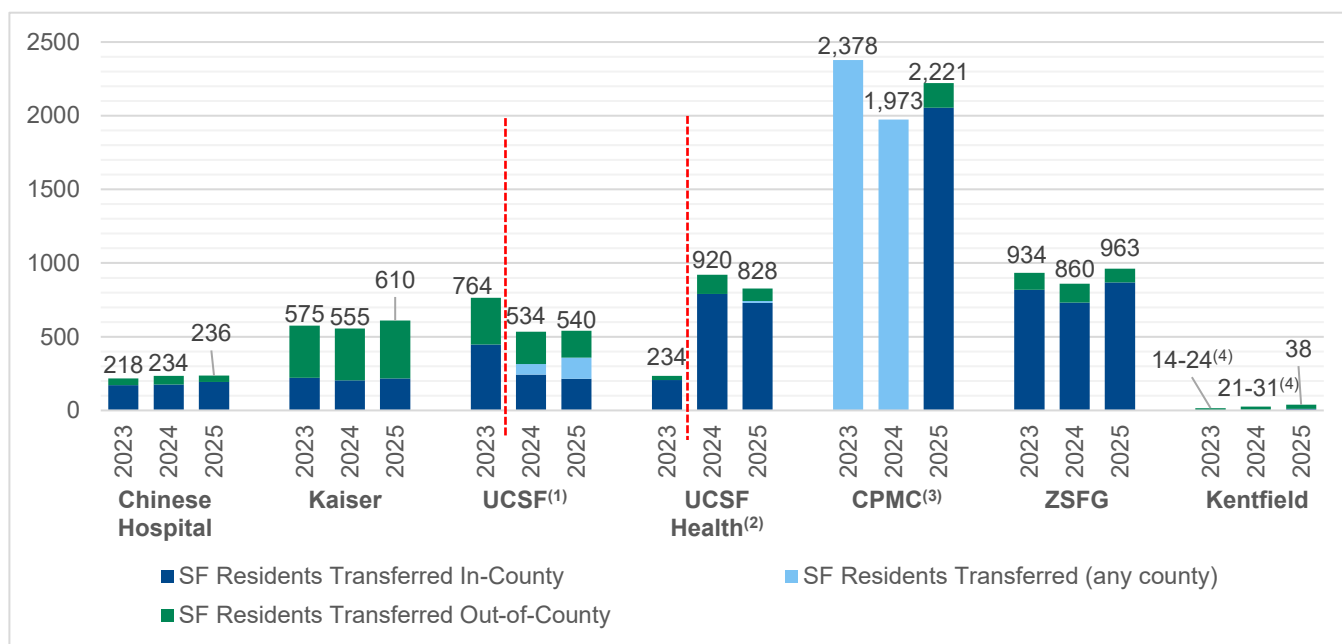

This 2025 calendar year report is the third-year hospitals have submitted data for both in-county and out-of-county transfers to SNFs. Figure 1 shows San Francisco resident transfers by hospitals from 2023 to 2025. While the total number of transfers to SNFs vary widely across reporting hospitals from 2023-2025, there is consistency between years for many of the reporting hospitals. Chinese Hospital, Kaiser, and ZSFG show relatively stable patterns of the in-county and out-of-county transfers since 2023. Changes in data collection methodology led to a decrease in total reported transfers for UCSF, and system affiliation led to an increase in the number of total reported transfers for UCSF Health. There was an 8% increase in total discharges to SNFs from 2024 to 2025. The proportion of SF residents to non-residents discharged has remained consistent over the last two reports, about 67% of all discharges are SF residents.

These two years should not be compared to 2023 calendar year data (indicated by the vertical red line). (2) In 2024, Dignity St. Mary's and Saint Francis hospitals became part of UCSF Health and beginning with the 2024 calendar year report, changed its methodology to more closely match UCSF's analysis methodology (indicated by the vertical red line). UCSF Health noted a real increase in total patient volume after the affiliation. The 2024 and 2025 data should not be compared to 2023 calendar year data. (3) Prior to 2025, CPMC reported transfers to both in-county and out-of-county together. (4) Ranges are shown to mask values of less than 10 in the above table.

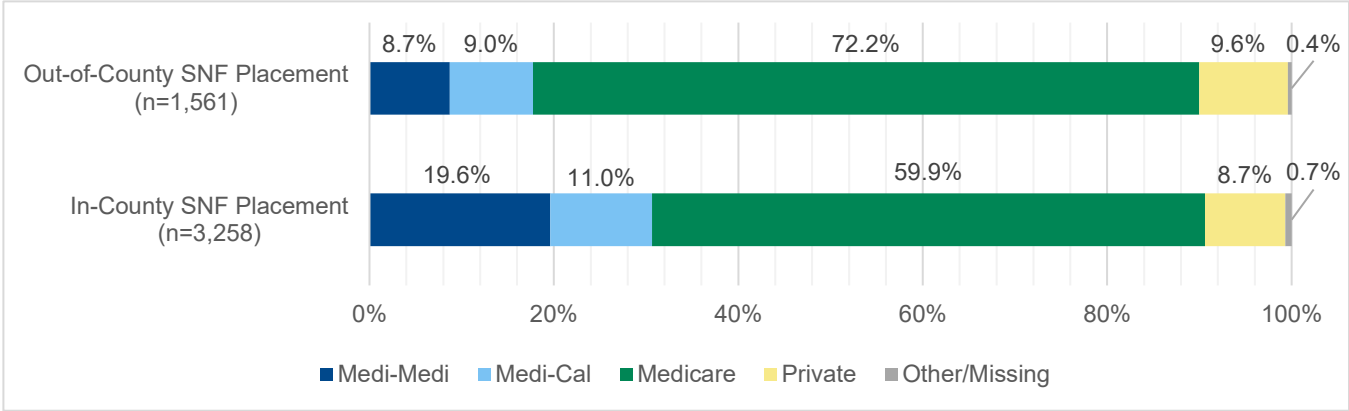
Reporting hospitals also report demographic characteristics³ for patients transferred to SNFs. As in previous reporting years, patients transferred to SNFs are primarily over the age of 65, are racially and ethnically diverse between hospitals, Medicare is the most common payor across hospitals, and most have permanent housing.

In response to a request from the Health Commission during the 2024 data presentation, the 2025 data request to hospitals asked for information about the Dual Eligible/Medi-Medi population. Medicare provides higher reimbursement for nursing services compared to Medi-Cal, and therefore this data may provide insights on access for patients who require long-term/custodial nursing care following hospitalization. Figure 2 provides a summary across Kaiser, Chinese Hospital, ZSFG, UCSF and UCSF Health showing that hospital transfers with dual eligibility represented a greater proportion of in-county SNF placements (20%) compared to out-of-county placements (9%). ZSFG had the greatest proportion of Medi-Medi encounters, representing approximately 57% of ZSFG's total in-county placements and

43% of ZSFG’s total out-of-county placements. Not all hospitals were able to report this data, but data query improvements may allow them to do so in future years.

Figure 2. Payor Types Represented by SNF Placements In-County and Out-of-County SNF Placements Across Hospitals, 2025

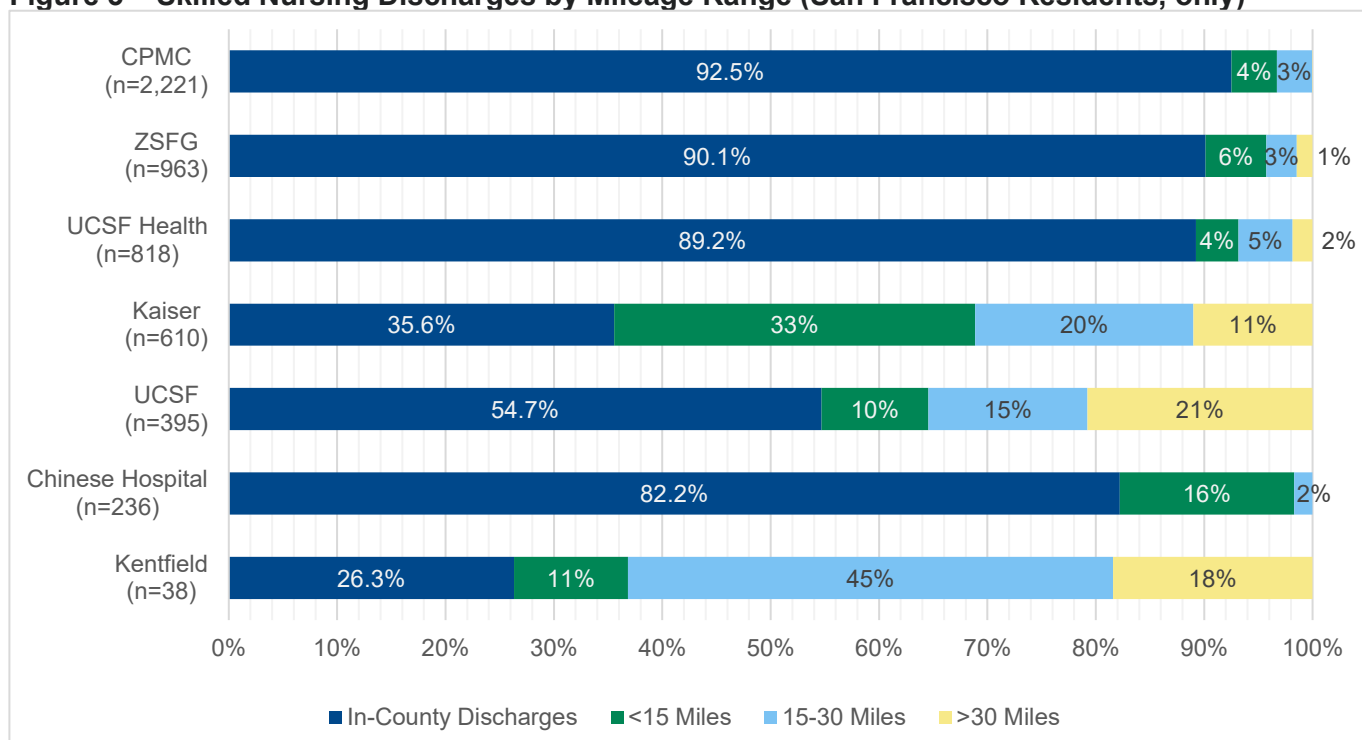


San Francisco Resident Transfers to SNFs by Distance

Approximately 81% of San Francisco residents transferred to SNFs from reporting health facilities were placed in facilities located within San Francisco. For the 19% transferred to SNFs outside of San Francisco, reporting health facilities were asked to provide a list of the SNFs and how many patients were transferred to each facility. With this information, DPH staff analyzed the estimated distance traveled for San Francisco residents.

Figure 3 shows all hospital skilled nursing transfers by estimated distance transferred for San Francisco residents only. The figure includes both transfers to in-county and out-of-county SNFs. Of San Francisco residents who were placed in a SNF out-of-county, approximately 47% were placed in SNFs less than 15 miles from the reporting health facility address and approximately 81% of out-of-county San Francisco resident discharges were placed in SNFs within 30 miles of the reporting health facility address. Finally, 92% of out-of-county transfers were placed in facilities located within the other eight Bay Area counties (San Mateo, Alameda, Contra Costa, Santa Clara, Marin, Sonoma, Solano, and Napa). Data for Jewish Home and Laguna Honda Hospital have been omitted from the figure as the facilities had fewer than ten total skilled nursing discharges.

Notes: (1) UCSF Health reported an additional 12 SF resident transfers to SNFs with unknown addresses. These 12 are not included in the figure. (2) UCSF Health reported 88 total facilities for 86 total SF resident transfers out-of-county. UCSF Health reported that two facilities in the dataset appear to be incorrect, but there is no way to identify which ones. This issue stems from a portion of the 2025 data being sourced from CommonSpirit, limiting UCSF Health's ability to verify the records. (3) UCSF reported an additional 143 SF resident transfers to SNFs with unknown addresses. These 143 are not included in the figure.

Notably, this distance data analysis does not examine nor provide insight into why a patient was placed in a particular facility. It only shows an estimated distance traveled for out-of-county placements, it does not show us whether these facilities were selected because of patient and family preference or because of bed availability.

Encounters Meeting SNF Criteria without Subsequent SNF Placement

The legislation requires reporting health facilities to report the number of patients who qualify for skilled nursing care while admitted to the reporting health facility but were not transferred to a skilled nursing facility. This information continues to be a challenge for reporting health facilities to assess for a few reasons:

- Facilities may not have robust referral systems that integrate with the EHR.
- Patient clinical presentation changes throughout the course of care in a hospital. A patient who may have qualified or referred to skilled nursing care one day may not need that level of care the next.

- Facilities do not standardly collect information on the intent to send a patient to a facility but there was limited bed availability.

For hospitals that submitted this information, data are included in the appendices.

Subacute Skilled Nursing Transfers

Reporting health facilities use a variety of methods to collect the number of encounters transferred to facilities for subacute skilled nursing care. Table 2 provides a summary of transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities by each facility. Across facilities, in 2025 there were fewer than 50 reported transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities, the majority of which were non-SF residents. LHH and Jewish Home and Rehab are not included in the table below. Patients of these facilities that develop an acute injury or condition, requiring a different level of care, would be transferred to a general acute care hospital to care for their acute condition before being transferred to a facility for subacute skilled nursing care.

Notes: (1) CPMC reported fewer than 10 in-county subacute transfers for calendar year 2025. These transfers represent current patients of CPMC Davies subacute unit transferring to an acute care hospital for acute hospitalization and back to Davies subacute unit. (2) Kentfield does not have a systematic way to accurately collect the number of transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities. To estimate the number of transfers, records of “discharge to other facility” were counted if the other facility was on DHCS’s Subacute Certified provers list. “Discharge to other facility” does not include discharges to other acute care facilities, home, or records if the patient expired.

For the last three reports, Chinese Hospital, Kaiser, UCSF Health, CPMC, and ZSFG hospitals have reported a consistent number of transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities (fewer than ten transfers, each). The total number of subacute transfers by UCSF has decreased over time, likely due to improved and more accurate use of the subacute discharge code implemented by UCSF in 2023.

Kentfield has reported fluctuating subacute transfers, as their reporting methodology has changed. For the 2025 report, DPH worked with Kentfield to determine a proxy metric, which likely overestimates the true number of subacute discharges.

Facilities are required to report demographic information of subacute skilled nursing transfers. Due to the small volume of subacute transfers by each hospital, identifying meaningful demographic trends is challenging. Medicare has been the most common payor amongst subacute skilled nursing out-of-county transfers, followed by Medi-Cal. Hospitals did not report any subacute transfers dually eligible for Medicare and Medi-Cal.

San Francisco Resident Transfers to Subacute SNFs

As there are no in-county admitting subacute skilled nursing facilities, all San Francisco residents transferred for subacute care are transferred out-of-county. For the 2025 calendar year data report, DPH staff also analyzed the distance for out-of-county subacute skilled nursing discharges. The analysis does not examine additional factors for why a patient was placed in a particular facility such as patient preference or because of bed availability.

Of the reported transfers to subacute SNFs, approximately 33% of San Francisco residents were placed in a subacute SNF within 15 miles of the reporting health facility and 81% were placed within a facility within 30 miles of the reporting health facility. Of note, approximately 10% of all San Francisco resident subacute skilled nursing discharges were missing facility address information.

Encounters Meeting Subacute Criteria without Subsequent Subacute SNF Placement

The legislation requires reporting health facilities to report the number of patients who qualify for subacute skilled nursing care while admitted to the reporting health facility but were not transferred to a facility for subacute skilled nursing care. As mentioned above, this information continues to be a challenge for reporting health facilities to assess for a few reasons:

- Facilities may not have robust referral systems that integrate with the EHR.
- Patient clinical presentation changes throughout the course of care in a hospital. A patient who may have qualified and have a referral for subacute care one day may not need that level of care by the time of discharge.
- Facilities do not standardly collect information on the intent to send a patient to a facility but there was limited bed availability.

For hospitals that submitted this information, data are included in the appendices.

Report Findings & Discussion

In San Francisco, nine health facilities reported data in compliance with Ordinance 077-22: seven acute care hospitals and two long-term care facilities. The findings for the 2025 calendar year skilled nursing care transfer report are as follows:

SNF & Subacute SNF Transfer Volume

- Health facilities reported more than 8,000 discharges to skilled nursing facilities (8% increase from 2024 to 2025). San Francisco residents represented more than 5,400 discharges to SNFs.
- There were fewer than 50 reported transfers to subacute skilled nursing facilities, which aligns with findings from the previous report. Approximately 54% of 2025 subacute transfers involved individuals who were not residents of San Francisco.

SNF & Subacute SNF Transfer Placement

Data Limitations

Although the data collection tool and hospital methodologies have improved since the first data report, many of the report limitations listed below have been discussed in prior reports. These limitations will likely continue to be challenges in future reports.

Electronic Health Record (EHR) Variations – A primary limitation of this data report is the variation in EHR systems used across reporting health facilities. While many of the hospitals use a common EHR (EPIC), reporting practices differ due to customized EHR features and differing hospital documentation protocols.

Transfers/Discharges for Subacute Skilled Nursing Care – Unlike discharges/transfers to a Skilled Nursing Facility⁴, there is not a standard identifier or code used in EHRs for transfers/discharges for Subacute Skilled Nursing Care. Some hospitals have customized their EHR systems to track subacute transfers, but others use indirect methods that likely capture a mix of subacute and general skilled nursing care discharges. This means that the data report does not accurately estimate the total number of subacute skilled nursing transfers by reporting hospitals.

Patient Discharge Record May be Incomplete or Inaccurate – Incomplete or inaccurate records make it difficult to identify the exact discharge location and thereby determine if the facility is located in- or out-of-county and its distance from the discharging facility. In some cases, data only included the facility name without a corresponding address. Many facilities also operate under a generic or corporate name which can obfuscate the specific location of the facility.

Inconsistent Methods to Estimate the Population who Qualified for Skilled Nursing or Subacute Skilled Nursing but were Discharged to Other Settings – Hospitals varied in data availability for estimating the population who may have needed skilled nursing or subacute care but were discharged to other settings. Some hospitals could access referral data, others only lower level of care (LLOC) data, and some had neither. As a result, this report does not aggregate or compare this data between hospitals. Additionally, hospitals noted that it is difficult to estimate how many patients may have needed a particular level of care but were ultimately discharged elsewhere, because a **patient's clinical status can change throughout the hospital stay**. Hospitals also do not routinely document when a patient was intended for a specific level of care but could not be placed due to limited bed availability. While some facilities normally track the number of days a patient waits for placement, this practice is not consistent across all reporting hospitals.

Skilled Nursing and Subacute Care Landscape

The following section reviews publicly available data from 2021 to 2025. This time frame aligns with the first year of data provided by San Francisco hospitals in compliance with the SNF report ordinance.

San Francisco, Bay Area, and California

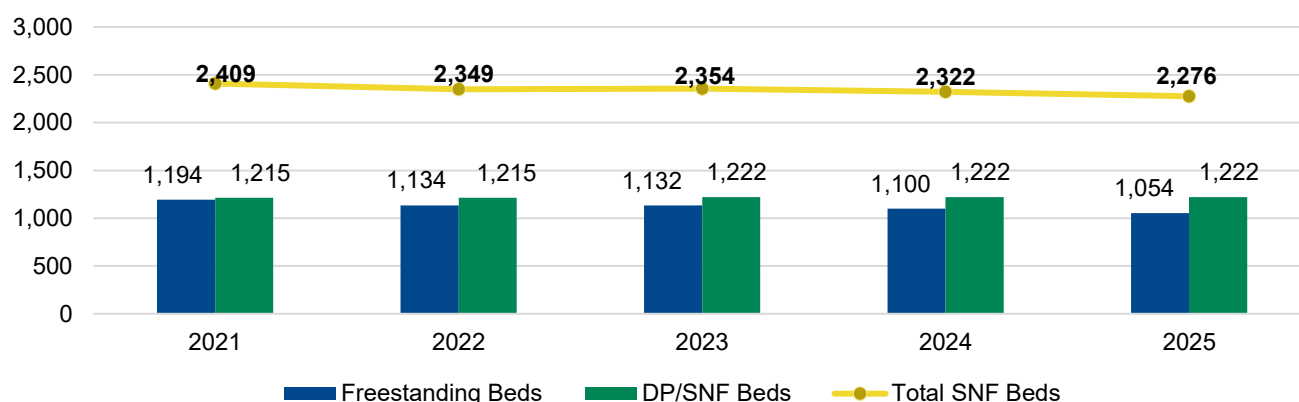
Skilled Nursing

San Francisco's overall supply of skilled nursing beds has not dramatically changed since 2021. Between 2021 and 2025, the city has seen an overall 6% decrease in the number of SNF beds across both freestanding and distinct-part facilities (2,409 SNF beds to 2,276 SNF beds). Notable changes to San Francisco's licensed SNF bed capacity include:

- Closure of Sheffield Convalescent Hospital in 2021 (**-34 SNF beds**)
- Reduction of beds at Heritage on the Marina due to construction/renovations beginning in 2023 (**-32 SNF beds**)
- Opening of skilled nursing beds at Chinese Hospital in 2023⁵ (**+23 DP/SNF beds**)
- Closure of St. Anne's Home in 2025 (**-46 freestanding SNF beds**)

Figure 4 shows the number of SNF beds in San Francisco from 2021 through 2025, across varying types of beds.

Across the eight other Bay Area counties – Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Solano and Sonoma – there are approximately 19,000 skilled nursing beds in 2025.

Approximately 90% of these are in freestanding SNFs. Between 2021 and 2025, the supply of SNF beds has increased by about 1%, fluctuating year-over-year. This increase has resulted in an overall

net gain of 269 skilled nursing beds in freestanding SNFs, and an overall net loss of 39 distinct-part nursing beds.

California’s skilled nursing bed supply has also fluctuated between 2021 and 2025, with an overall 2.3% decrease in the number of licensed SNF beds across the state. Skilled nursing beds in freestanding SNFs represent approximately 94% of the statewide supply of beds. Between 2021 and 2025, the number of freestanding SNFs beds statewide has decreased by 3,000 beds, from 110,000 to 107,000 beds.

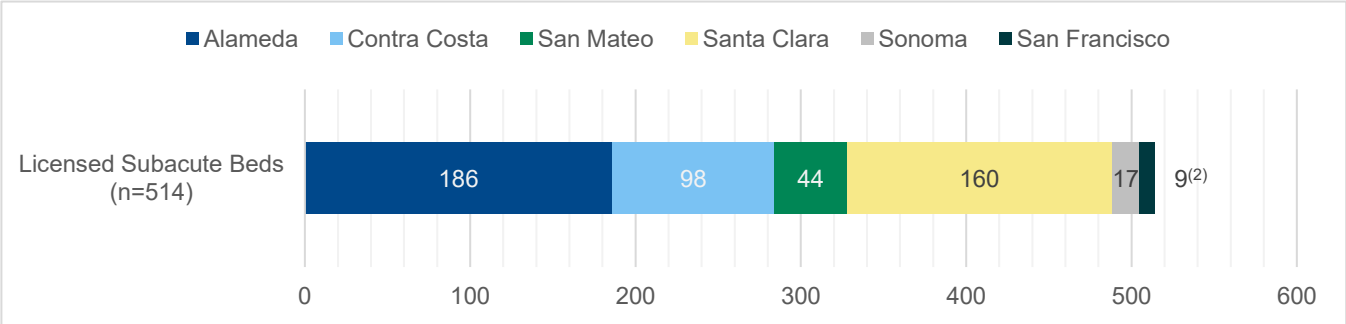
A final notable difference between San Francisco, the Bay Area and the State is the mix of skilled nursing beds. In San Francisco County, distinct-part skilled nursing beds (part of a hospital) represent a larger proportion of the total skilled nursing bed supply (about 50% of total skilled nursing beds). This is due to both Laguna Honda Hospital (769 beds) and Jewish Home and Rehab Center (362 beds) being in San Francisco. Across the Bay Area and the State, less than 10% of skilled nursing beds are licensed as distinct-part beds.

Subacute Skilled Nursing

San Francisco has one subacute skilled nursing facility in the city, located at CPMC Davies campus. This subacute unit is not accepting new patients and will stop providing subacute skilled nursing services when the last patient leaves. Therefore, patients in San Francisco hospitals who require subacute skilled nursing services are discharged to a facility out-of-county.

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) manages the California Subacute Care Program and sets the standards for participating facilities. According to publicly available data, in California there are approximately 4,300 subacute beds across more than 100 facilities. There are approximately 500 subacute beds (13 facilities) across Bay Area counties.

Appendix A. Data Report Requirements

Ordinance 077-22 sets forth the requirements for annual data reports, as follows:

1. The total number of patients who were City residents and the total number of patients who were not City residents, transferred by the Reporting Health Facility to an Out-of-County Health Facility for the purpose of receiving Skilled Nursing Care.
2. The total number of patients who were City residents and the total number of patients who were not City residents, qualified for Skilled Nursing Care while admitted to the Reporting Health Facility but were not transferred by the Reporting Health Facility to an Out-of-County Health Facility.
3. The following aggregate demographic information for each of the above categories of patient:
 - a. Age
 - b. Race/Ethnicity
 - c. Gender (as well as sexual orientation and gender identity, if standardly collected by the reporting health facility)
 - d. Patient Insurance Provider (by way of example, but not limitation, Medi-Cal, Medicare, or the specific private insurance provider)
 - e. Housing Status (by way of example, but not limitation, people experiencing homelessness, marginally housed, or permanently housed)

Appendix B. Reporting Health Facility Data

To protect patient privacy, values that are potentially identifiable have been suppressed. Specifically:

- Data values of less than ten (i.e., 1-9) are suppressed as indicated by the text “<10”.
- For demographic categories, values of ten or greater may be suppressed to mask an adjacent value that is less than ten in the same sub-category. Those values are indicated by the text “>10”.

The “Qualified for Transfer” column in the tables below indicates encounters who were potentially appropriate for (or were referred to) that level of care but were ultimately not transferred to a SNF or Subacute SNF.
