

A UNITED FUTURE FOR ARTS AND CULTURE

A VITAL ENGINE FOR SAN FRANCISCO'S CULTURAL AND ECONOMIC VIBRANCY

- \$24.5M+ in arts and culture grants awarded to 350+ grantees across San Francisco, anchoring the city's cultural ecosystem (FY25).
- Supported **55,000+ public events**, reaching **34.5M attendees** and engaging **14,000+ local artists** (FY25).
- Nearly \$3M invested in 7 Cultural Centers.
- Stewardship of 4,000+ public artworks, including 105 monuments and memorials.
- 241 permitted productions (TV, film, photography, commercials) generating \$17.5M+ in local revenue with every \$1 rebated through the incentive program returning \$12.68 in spending (FY 25).

The City aims to better support San Francisco's arts and culture ecosystem through a more unified approach to arts and culture administration.







OUR PATH SO FAR...

- GFTA and SFAC both began strategic planning projects in 2024 and collectively engaged with over 400 arts and culture community members about their needs
- Mayor Lurie's FY25 budget united San Francisco's arts agencies to strengthen the city's cultural ecosystem and fuel its comeback

- The consulting team AMS Planning & Research delivered comprehensive research on the structures and governance of arts agencies in the 25 largest cities in the U.S.
- With this context in place, the Mayor's Office is now holding 3 convenings, facilitated by AMS, to hear thoughts and gather input from San Francisco's arts and culture community
