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6. **Community Input Subcommittee Chair(s) (Melinda Burrus, Prasanthi Patel) Vote** 10 minutes [discussion and action]

Jennifer motions to table a delayed vote to ensure Prasanthi Patel is present. Melinda seconds. 5 votes motion passes.

7. **Review of SDDTAC SWOT** 30 minutes [discussion and possible action]

Staff reviewed SDDTAC SWOT document. Staff organized the SWOT document by common themes and provided draft recommendations. Staff also shared the presentation from Blythe Young from AHA at the Infrastructure subcommittee. The infrastructure subcommittee will be presenting to the SDDTAC of options to extend the SDDTAC beyond 2028 and the possibility of increasing the soda tax and what options there are in doing so. This additional information is to support the refresh of the SDDTAC strategic plan.

Staff will be meeting with Michelle Kim on the SWOT document and provide more detailed information to the SDDTAC at the August SDDTAC meeting. Member suggests to educating Board of Supervisors and messaging on the work of the soda tax and moving forward.

8. Community Input Subcommittee Chair(s) (Melinda Burrus, Prasanthi Patel) Vote 10 minutes Members agree to return to the subcommittee chair vote since Prasanthi Patel is present. Staff shares that in some subcommittees, there were two co-chairs and shared the chair role. Candidates share their experiences and what they hope to contribute to the community input subcommittee chair role.

Melinda shares that she is a Bayview/SF native, working at Leah's Pantry and wants to be chair, works with several groups who discuss about food access, physical activity, and hope to bring community voices to the table.

Prasanthi shares her public health background and is available to work with community-based organizations to gather their feedback on the work of the soda tax.

Melinda and Prasanthi agree to share the role of co-chairs of community input subcommittee.

Jennifer motions to vote Melinda Burrus and Prasanthi Patel work as co-chairs for the community input subcommittee. Shoon seconds. 4 votes. Melinda Burrus and Prasanthi Patel are co-chairs of the community input subcommittee.

9. Continued Discussion on Subcommittee Community Engagement 20 minutes [discussion]

Staff share that Mayor's Office staff will be present at the June 18th SDDTAC meeting and ask members to consider specific questions they may have in regards to the Mayor's proposed budget. Staff provided high level overview of the comparison of the SDDTAC FY 25-26 budget recommendations vs. Mayor's proposed SDDT budget. Members share some of the questions they would like to have answered at next week's SDDTAC meeting. Members are encouraged to invite



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their seat representative groups to attend the meeting or bring their concerns/recommendations to the meeting to share with Mayor's Office staff.

Staff shared Draft SDDT Elevator Speech and to share with their networks.

The Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee (SDDTAC) ensures that San Francisco's sugary drink tax—generating over \$15 million annually—is invested in programs that reduce health disparities linked to sugary drink consumption, like type 2 diabetes, heart disease, and tooth decay. Research shows sugary drinks are the single largest source of added sugar in the American diet and disproportionately marketed to low-income communities and communities of color. That's why community input is critical—we need your voice to help guide funding toward the neighborhoods most impacted and ensure resources support culturally relevant, community-driven, data-driven and evidence-based solutions.

On June 18, the Mayor's Assistant Policy Chief on Health, Homelessness and Family Services, Shalini Rana, will be presenting the Mayor's Proposed budget for SDDT budget. It's an opportunity for you to come out to provide public comment and share your voice.

Member would like to ask do they expect us to get the funds where small programs have been trying to survive, the tax was to help smaller communities and there is frustration in the community about the redirection and allocation of soda tax funding.

Public Comment:

Eleana Binder, Policy Director, GLIDE – In the community, we are finding the budget to be confusing and frustrating to figure out where exactly the money is going. GLIDE is one of the policy, systems and environmental grantees that has been completely cut and grant has been cancelled. It has been difficult to see where the funding is going to at HSA. The explanation that was shared at the Food Security Task Force, that the funds are due to federal cuts and in a different section, it says there is increased money for HSA, programming but partly because of new RFP procurement cycles. Since GLIDE is a recipient of both, HSA for the food funding and the soda tax funding, which GLIDE values both approaches. We want to be able to feed people in immediate ways but also address systemic barriers to healthy food and clean water, which we obviously have issues with in the Tenderloin, where there is no full service grocery store and we had hope to address things like the lack of grocery store access and affordable food access in in the Tenderloin with the Black community. Glide serves 3 meals a day but that doesn't work for folks who may not be able to come to Glide due to their work schedules and still need to find ways to get healthy and affordable food later in the evening for their families. Thank you for your time and recommendations and we are really trying to support you in trying to find ways to work with the Mayor's Office and Board of Supervisors on these budget cuts.

Haley, Farming Hope – Recipient from HSA through grocery programs and SDDT Healthy Communities grantee. The soda tax funding is so much more versatile than the HSA funding, we value both approaches deeply. Farming Hope has met with supervisors to discuss budget cuts and relay the confusion on where the funds are going and false narratives on how the funds are being



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shifted. We need to remember that this is just a cut to soda tax grantees. It is unclear of the new HSA food grants. Farming Hope met with Supervisor Bilal Mahmood, who seems to be the most receptive to food security and sovereignty compared to other supervisors. Thank you all and have the support of the community.

SDDTAC Budget Descriptions FY 25-26 and FY 26-27

COMMUNITY-BASED (CB) GRANTS

Health Education, Food Security, Physical Activity

DPH should contract directly with CBOs through an RFP process managed through the Community Health Equity and Promotion (CHEP) Branch of the Department of Public Health. CBG should support community-based programs and services that address



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the health inequities of those most targeted by the beverage industry. Funding should go to Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and Faith Based Organizations (FBOs) for the following strategies:

- A. Health Education activities including, chronic disease prevention, healthy eating and active living, tap water promotion, oral/dental health
- B. Physical Activity opportunities, including a) Dance and movement, sports, yoga, walking groups, biking, etc.; b) Changes to the built environment (i.e. sidewalks, streets, parks, buildings, etc.) or safety of the built environment that facilitates increased physical activity and active transportation)
- C. Food Security, including a) Community-based pantries, community-based hot meals, community kitchens and community home delivery services; b) Increased financial resources (i.e. wages, income, government nutrition supplements, vouchers, etc.); c) Changes to the built environment that facilitate food security; d) Pursuit of institutional or local policies that facilitate food security; and e) Food Access, including community-based food systems, approaches, community-based pantries, community-based hot meals, community kitchens and community home delivery services, etc.
- D. Water Promotion, such as support for Spa Water Supplies, station maintenance and beautification, refillable water bottles to distribute to communities, water testing
- E. Community Based Participatory Research

Community Based Organizations (CBO) working with SFUSD

Recommend 3% of all CBO funding should go towards CBOs implementing programs/ or initiatives that take place in school settings. Funding to issue grants to CBOs should follow the guidelines above. To support disbursement of funds, the funds should be directed to SFDPH-CHEP which works with SFUSD to fund CBOs that work with SFUSD.

FOOD ACCESS

Healthy Food Purchasing Supplement - Support programs that increase financial resources to purchase healthy food such as vouchers and food purchasing incentives. These funds should be distributed through a Request for Proposal (RFP) process. Funding should support programs and services that increase financial resources to purchase healthy food; access to healthy fruits and vegetables while minimizing processed foods for high-risk communities; foods that are affordable and convenient; and programs that support the consumption of healthy foods including the ability to prepare and store meals and the knowledge of basic nutrition, food safety and cooking. Priority programs should incorporate a community-based food security perspective and have demonstrated increased ability of food insecure residents to purchase, access, and consume consumption of healthy, fresh, low-to-no cost and culturally appropriate foods, including but not limited to food vouchers/ incentives, transportation and delivery and prepared foods.

Healthy Retail SF – Supporting small business to increase healthy food access in high risk, impacted communities and neighborhoods by:

- A. Supporting business operations
- B. Promoting community engagement



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C. Improving the retail environment

Food Transportation for Food Distribution Centers – Support programs that provide access to healthy, culturally-sensitive food (groceries and/or meals) with transportation costs of getting food to their centers and delivery of food (groceries and/or meals) to their clients. Funded organizations will work with local food producers to source their distributions and prioritize food delivery for those with mobility difficulties. Transportation costs can include vehicle purchases, fuel costs, and/or payments to organizations that specialize in food transportation services.

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY & WELLNESS

Peace Parks - To support staffing and supplies, including healthy food, for Peace Parks programs in target populations.

SVIP - Transportation for Peace Parks participants

REQUITY - Outreach, scholarships, recreation equity - Requity offers free dynamic, engaging, and culturally relevant recreation programming to youth under 18 living in shelters, foster care, public housing, or in housing developments. Through a combination of onsite and hyper-local programs, coupled with extensive outreach. Requity increases access to and participation in RPD's existing programs and scholarships by educating and informing families on what RPD can offer them.

SAN FRANCISCO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (SFUSD)

School food, nutrition education - To improve the quality and appeal of school meals and support nutrition education to increase participation in school meal programs (for example: cooking and serving equipment, staff professional development, and innovative procurement and menu strategies to increase freshly prepared food). Funding will target schools with the largest populations of high-risk students that are disproportionately targeted by the sugary drinks industry.

Student Led Action - Support student led efforts to decrease consumption of sugary drinks and increase awareness of sugary drinks consumption among students, with focus on schools with the largest populations of high-risk students that are disproportionately targeted by the sugary drinks industry. SFUSD should provide to SDDTAC a proposal of how funding will be spent through student led action. Funding to also support adequate staffing for implementation.

ORAL HEALTH

Community Oral Health Task Forces - Support development of community infrastructure such as oral health community task forces that incorporate diverse stakeholders for outreach, education, and interventions to address the oral health needs of children in high-risk populations.

School-based Sealant Application – Support school-based preventative oral health programing placing dental



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sealants and fluoride varnish within SFUSD schools serving high risk target populations.

School-based Education and Case Management (Early Childhood Education/Nutrition Settings) - Following an RFP process, support Early Care and Education (ECE) providers and Head Start programs serving high risk target populations in providing on-site oral health education, toothbrushing, oral health screenings, community-dental clinic linkages and case management for children experiencing early childhood caries.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Marketing, Promotion, Outreach

Funds to DPH/CBOs/media firms to support media and communications that may include:

- a. grassroots, community-driven awareness campaigns about the intent of the SDDT and the impact of the allocated funds
- b. city-wide communications campaign highlighting the impact and importance of the SDDT
- c. communications materials for merchants
- d. communicate the harmful impact of sugary drinks and healthy alternatives

Examples include community-driven, messaging, print, online, and social media campaigns. This also includes regular communication to SF Board of Supervisors, Mayor's Office, Board of Education and other elected officials via newsletters and other mechanisms.

Evaluation, Research, Data Support, Capacity Building

- 1. Professional services:

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION/NUTRITION

To enhance childcare environments and promote healthy behaviors among children aged zero to five through supporting initiatives that advance nutrition security and oral/dental health, focusing on priority populations that are disproportionately targeted by the sugary drinks industry.
