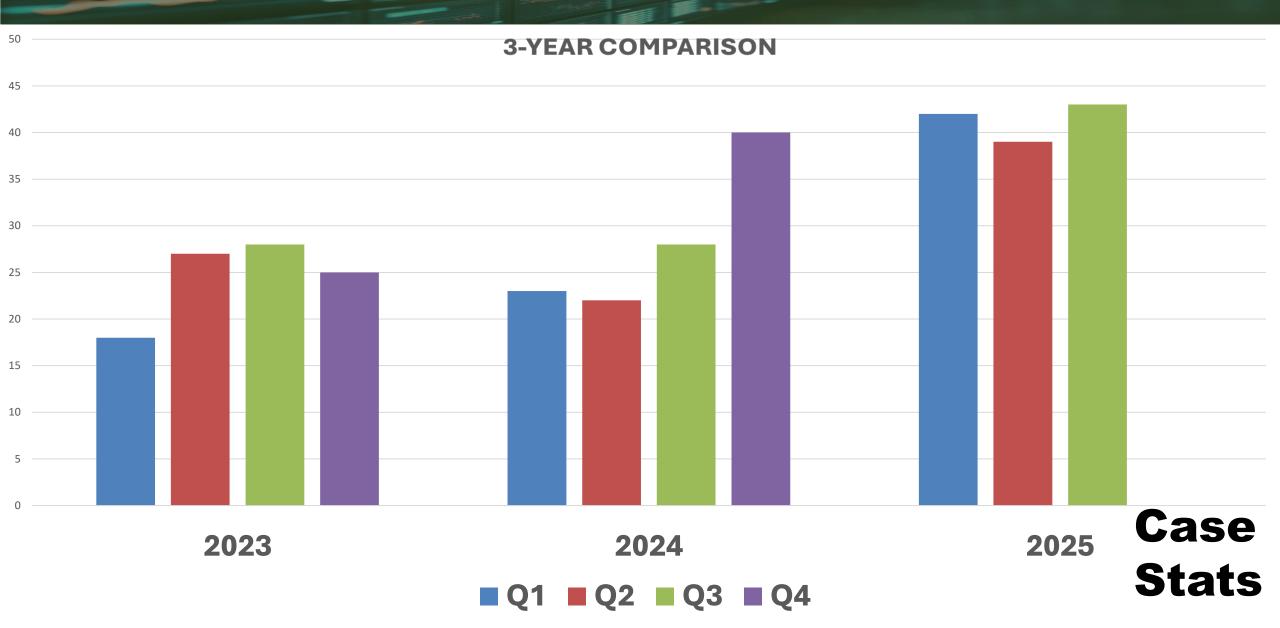

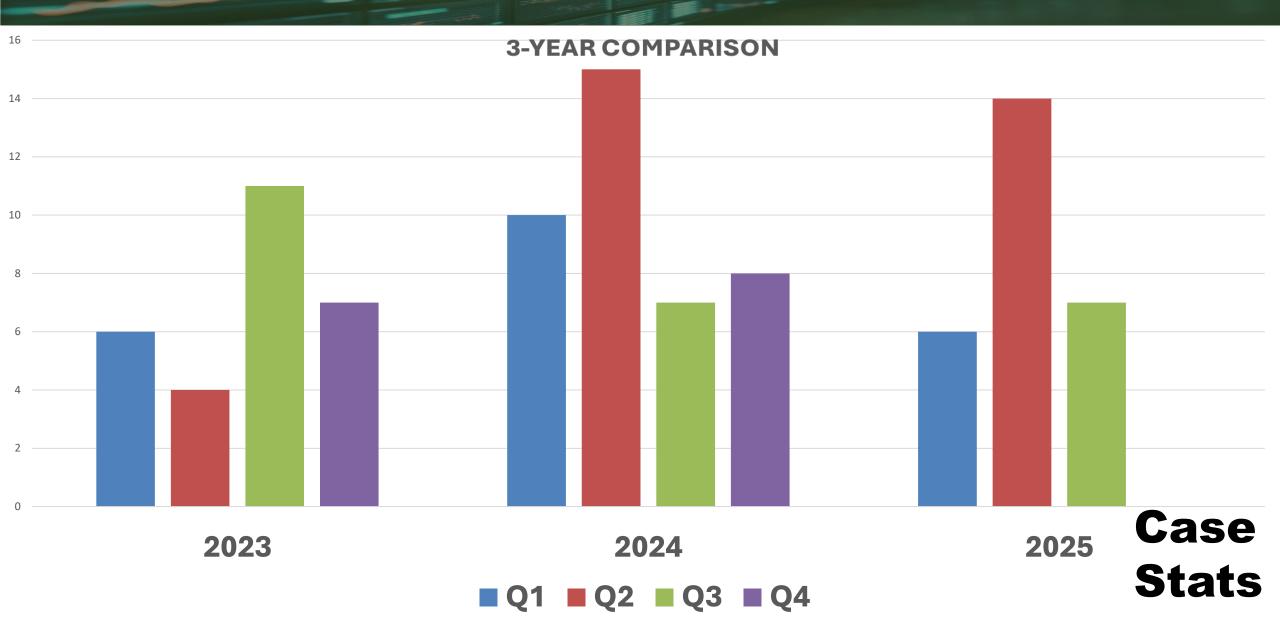
Cases Opened Q3 2025



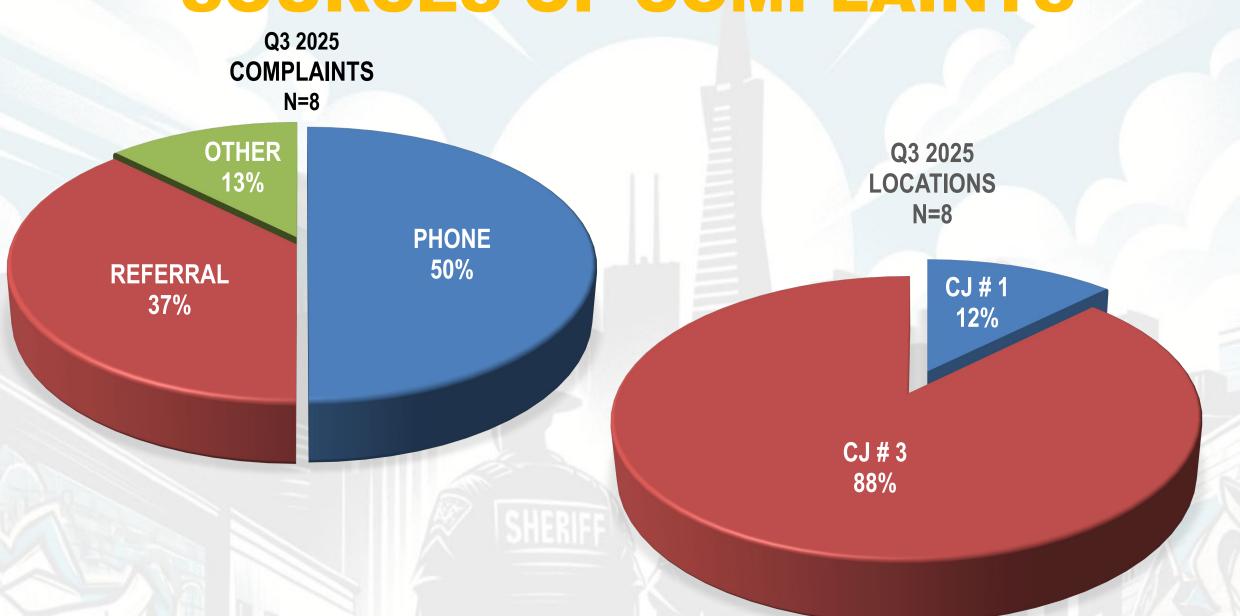
Cases Pending Q3 2025



Cases Closed Q3 2025



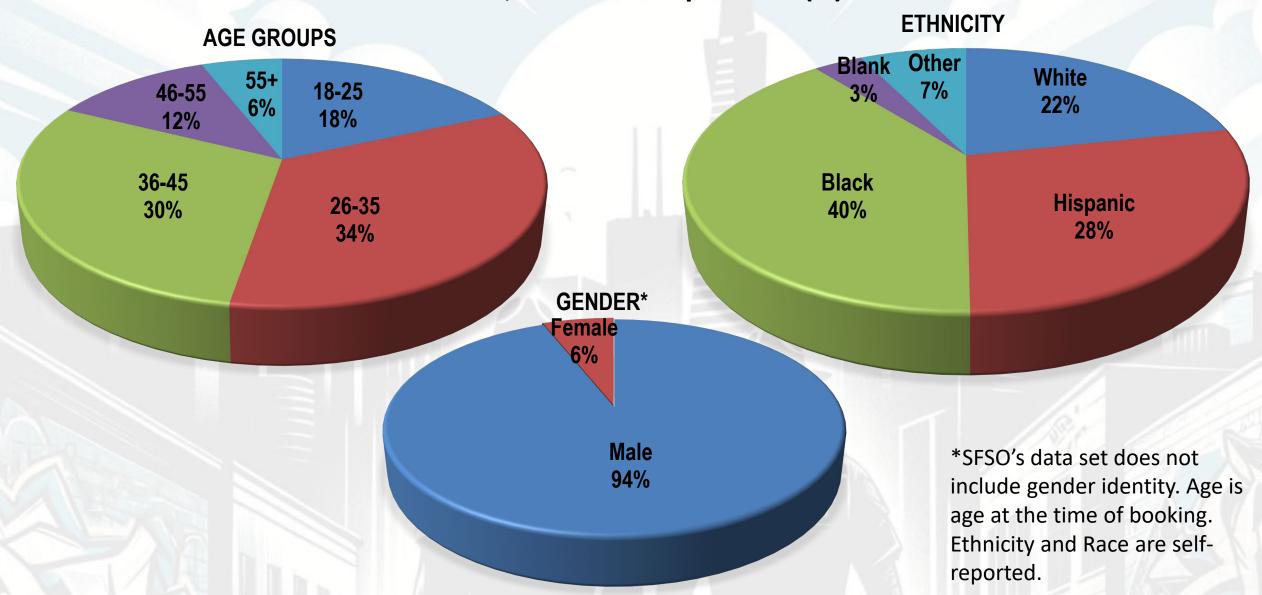

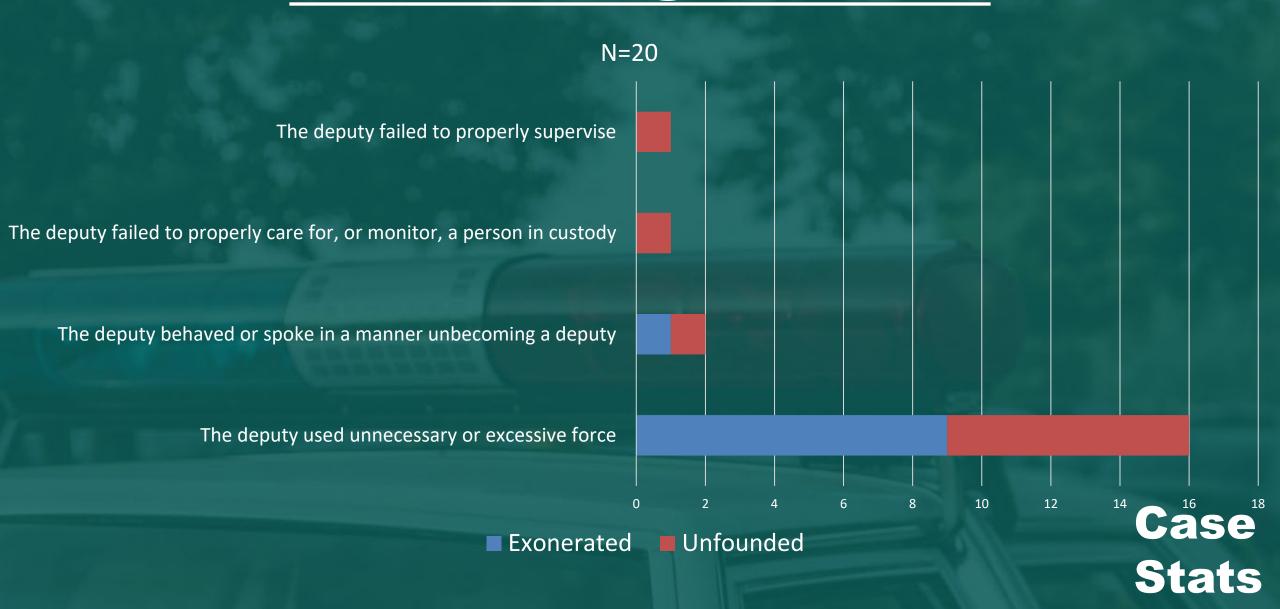

Appendix 1 – Disposition Definitions Policy 1010.5.4

- ▶ 1010.5.4 DISPOSITIONS
- ► Each personnel complaint shall be classified with one of the following dispositions available to the Administration:
 - ▶ **Unfounded** When the investigation discloses that the alleged acts did not occur or did not involve department employees. Complaints that are determined to be clearly not true will fall within the classification of unfounded (Penal Code § 832.8).
 - ▶ **Exonerated** When the investigation discloses that the alleged act occurred, however, the act was justified, lawful and/or proper.
 - ▶ **Not sustained** When the investigation discloses that there is insufficient evidence to sustain the complaint allegation or to conclusively disprove the allegation.
 - ▶ **Sustained** A final determination by an investigating agency, commission, board, hearing officer, or arbitrator, as applicable, following an investigation and opportunity for an administrative appeal pursuant to Government Code § 3304 and Government Code § 3304.5 that the actions of a deputy or employee were found to violate law or department policy (Penal Code § 832.8).

Appendix 2 – Media Retention / Video Surveillance Audit Policy 416.5 & 416.7

416.5 STORAGE AND RETENTION OF MEDIA

All downloaded media shall be stored in a secure area with access restricted to authorized persons. A recording needed as evidence shall be copied to a suitable medium and booked into evidence in accordance with established evidence procedures. All actions taken with respect to retention of media shall be appropriately documented. The type of video surveillance technology employed and the manner in which recordings are used and stored will affect retention periods. The recordings should be stored and retained in accordance with the established records retention schedule and for a minimum of one year. Prior to destruction, written consent shall be obtained from the City Attorney, only if the recording is subject to a litigation hold. If recordings are evidence in any claim filed or any pending litigation, they shall be preserved until pending litigation is resolved (Government Code § 34090.6). Recordings should be retained consistent with any litigation hold letter received by the Department. Any recordings needed as evidence in a criminal or civil proceeding shall be copied to a suitable medium and booked into evidence in accordance with current evidence procedures.

416.7 VIDEO SURVEILLANCE AUDIT

The Sheriff or the authorized designee will conduct an annual review of the public safety video surveillance system. The review should include an analysis of the cost, benefit and effectiveness of the system, including any public safety issues that were effectively addressed or any significant prosecutions that resulted, and any systemic operational or administrative issues that were identified, including those related to training, discipline or policy. The results of each review shall be appropriately documented and maintained by the Sheriff or the authorized designee. Any recommendations for training or policy should be promptly addressed.
