Interim Housing Expansion	Funding for up to 120 beds for the Rapid Engagement Shelter and Treatment for Opioid Recovery (RESTORE) program	\$31.8 million	
DV Hotel Vouchers	Funds 10 new emergency hotel vouchers for households fleeing violence	\$1.05 million	
Family Hotel Vouchers	Continues funding for 130 family hotel vouchers brought online in FY2024-25 under the Safer Families Plan. This funding continues the vouchers for an additional 18 months beyond the original funding term	\$9.9 million	
Adult Hotel Vouchers *	Adds 50 new adult Hotel Vouchers to the Homelessness Response System to be used in collaboration with the RV Intervention strategy.	\$3.4 million	
RV Intervention	Funds new strategy for people living in RVs and vehicles in partnership with SFMTA. Funds outreach, case management, problem solving funds, a vehicle buy-back program, hotel vouchers, and rapid rehousing expansion.	\$4.7 million

Our City Our Home (OCOH) Fund: Approved Trailing Legislation

The revised legislation supports the City to address the crisis on our streets and does not make any cuts to existing OCOH funded programs, including:

- One-time reallocation of \$34.7 million, including \$19.5 million in interest earnings and \$15.3 million in unprogrammed housing balances to support the Mayor's Breaking the Cycle initiative.
- Suspends 12% cap on short-term (<5 years) rental subsidies.
- Authorizes the City to expend up to \$19.1 million in future OCOH Fund revenue through FY25-27 on any eligible programs, rather than allocating funds based on expenditure percentages specified in the tax code subject to the Board's approval of the Annual Appropriations Ordinance. Any additional revenue would have to be allocated in accordance with the tax code or require a supermajority of the Board to reallocate.
