



## San Francisco Coordinated Entry Prioritization Memo

Effective February 4, 2026

**PURPOSE:** To provide transparency and clarity on how Housing Referral Status households are determined and referred to Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) or Rapid Rehousing (RRH) through the Homelessness Response System (HRS) and communicating adjustments to the Housing Referral Status range.

**BACKGROUND:** Coordinated Entry, a component of the City's Homelessness Response System, is a community-wide mandated process to match households experiencing homelessness to access available resources for which they are eligible. A standard population-specific assessment is used to serve three populations: Adults, Families, and Transitional Age Youth (TAY) age 18-24 experiencing homelessness.

**The Housing Primary Assessment** is a scored interview tool based on the following Coordinated Entry prioritization criteria: chronicity of homelessness, vulnerability to homelessness, and barriers to housing. Based on the Primary Assessment score, a household is prioritized as either Housing Referral Status or Problem Solving Status.

**Housing Referral Status** Households are referred and matched to available PSH or RRH. Problem Solving Status Households are provided continuous Problem Solving interventions to identify other housing solutions such as move-in assistance and relocation support. Both Housing Referral Status and Problem Solving Status represent a path to permanent housing.

HSH estimates what proportion of households known to Coordinated Entry will be assigned Housing Referral Status based on the total number of households currently in Coordinated Entry, the distribution of their Primary Assessment score, and the projected availability of Rapid Rehousing and Permanent Supportive Housing resources.

**Any person experiencing homelessness in San Francisco who is Housing Referral Status before a range adjustment remains Housing Referral Status after the range adjustment.**

Note ranges are in effect until the Coordinated Entry Redesign process is completed. We believe that CE Redesign will move us from specific queues for specific interventions to a list where households will be matched in order of priority and filtered based on their match to a specific housing type that best suits their needs.

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## 1. Family Housing Referral Status Categories

HSH will prioritize families experiencing homelessness to one of two permanent housing programs, Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) or Rapid Rehousing (RRH).

### Family Rapid Rehousing:

#### HSH is Re-Opening the Rapid Rehousing Referral Status Range for families

- The Rapid Rehousing Referral Status range is 90-114 points for families experiencing homelessness regardless of benefits status. HSH estimates 10-20% of families experiencing homelessness in SF will be in this range.
- The Housing Referral Status range is changing for the CalWORKs Housing Support Program (HSP): Effective June 26, families on CalWorks will no longer be prioritized for CalWorks Housing Support Program (HSP) regardless of score. This change is being implemented because of the reduction in the number of available HSP slots in future months.

### Family Permanent Supportive Housing:

#### The Housing Referral Status range for Family PSH is narrowing to 115 to 160

- There are many families already waiting in PSH Referral Status for a Permanent Supportive Housing offer. HSH is narrowing the range. HSH estimates that less than 10% of families experiencing homelessness in SF will be in this range.

## 2. Adult Housing Referral Status Categories

Adults are the largest population of people experiencing homelessness in San Francisco. While the largest Permanent Supportive Housing portfolio is for adults, it is currently the lowest available and projected housing in the San Francisco Homelessness Response System.

### Adult Permanent Supportive Housing:

The Housing Referral Status range is 123-160 for adults. HSH projects that approximately 10- 20% of adults who complete the Housing Primary Assessment will become Housing Referral Status with this range.

### Veterans Permanent Supportive Housing:

In San Francisco, the supply of housing resources in the Homeless Response System for veterans is proportionally higher than other populations of people experiencing homelessness. The Permanent Supportive Housing Referral Status range is narrowing to 90 – 160 for Veterans. HSH projects that approximately 40% of veterans who complete a Housing Primary Assessment will become Housing Referral Status.

### County Adult Assistance Program Permanent Supportive Housing:

Adults in San Francisco who are active in the County Adult Assistance Program ([CAAP](#)) are eligible for CAAP Permanent Supportive Housing. The range is 90-122 for CAAP eligible households. HSH projects that approximately 20% of adults on CAAP who complete a Housing Primary Assessment will become CAAP Housing Referral Status.

### 3. Youth Housing Referral Status Categories

In San Francisco, the supply of housing resources in the Homelessness Response System for Youth is notably higher than for other populations of people experiencing homelessness due to Rapid Rehousing (RRH) resources dedicated to Youth.

#### Update 2/4/26:

**Housing Referral Status Range for Youth RRH is expanding from 115 – 122 to 0 – 122:** This adjustment is being implemented due to an increase in the number of RRH slots in future months. Youth experiencing homelessness will be offered Rapid Rehousing following they:

- Score 0 – 122 on the primary assessment; and
- Are not on fixed income (e.g. SSDI); and
- Are ages between 18 – 27 years old

Housing Referral Status Range for Youth PSH is 123-160. Approximately 20% of youth experiencing homelessness who complete a Housing Primary Assessment will be Housing Referral Status for Permanent Supportive Housing.
