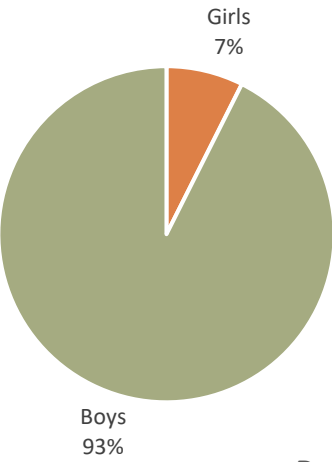

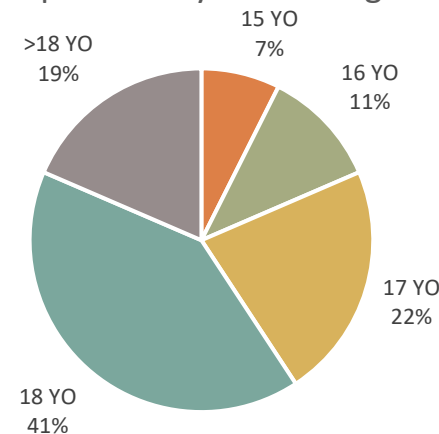

# Juvenile Justice Center Snapshot: 7/15/25 (N=27)

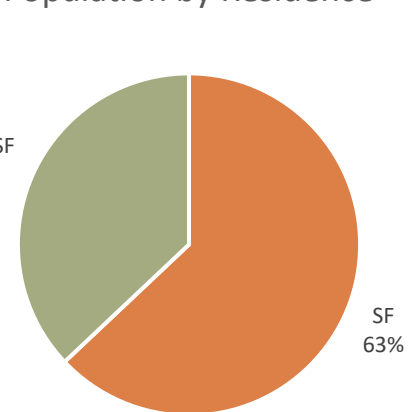
Population by Gender



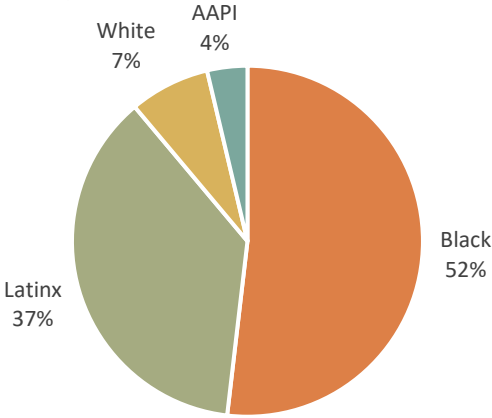
Population by Current Age



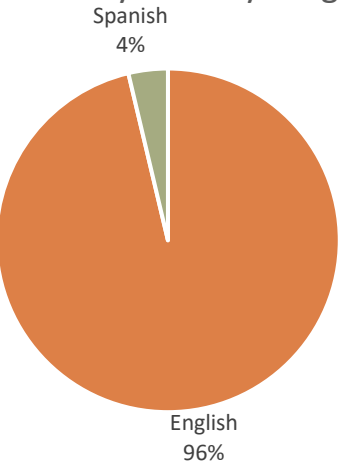
Population by Residence



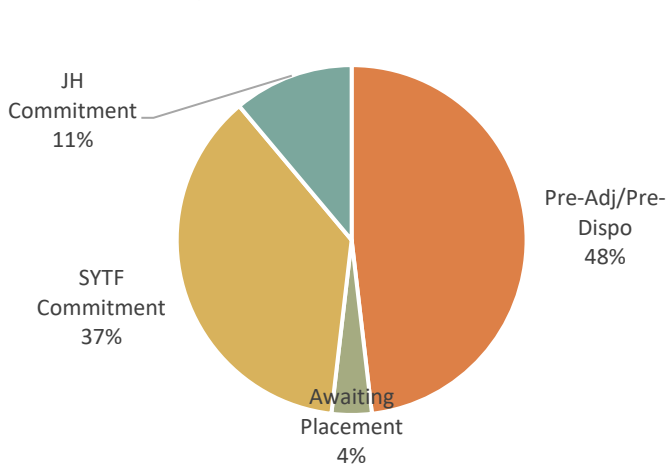
Population by Race/ Ethnicity

# Transformation Updates

## 2 PM Interagency Meeting

- San Francisco Juvenile Justice Multidisciplinary Team
- As of June 26, 2025, CARC joining JPD, SPY, HSA, SFUSD
  - **San Francisco Justice Services Care Model** milestone
- Pursuant to WIC 830.1: Exchange information regarding juveniles arrested in San Francisco and referred to JPD, including their juvenile justice, health, child welfare, educational, service, and assessment history, in order to prevent, identify, and control crime.

# Reentry Services Grants

- Grants to **Sunset Youth Services** and **Sharp Circle, Inc.** to provide reentry coordination and support services to young people **committed to the Secure Youth Treatment Facility or Juvenile Hall**, who have a current or prior sustained 707(b) offense
- Staff from each program will build trust and relationships while young people are committed to facilitate a more successful transition to the community
- Each agency has hired reentry coordinator(s) and intensive case manager(s) to support this group of young people:
  - **Coordinators** work closely with JPD, young person, and their circle of support while young person is in custody to develop reentry plan, identify resources and programs, procure any necessary items, and ensure young person is set up for success upon release
  - **Intensive case managers** closely engage with young person after release; support young person in navigating systems and building life skills and healthy relationships; and help guide young person throughout their reentry.

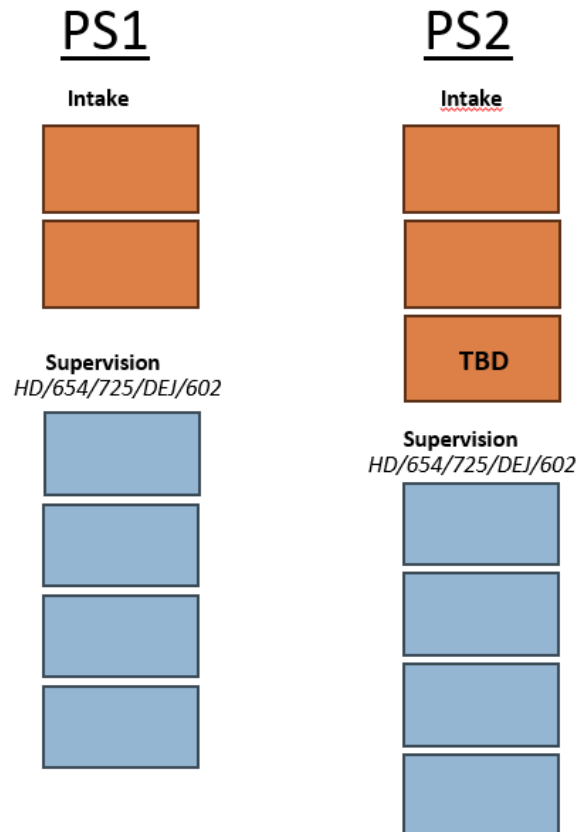


# Probation Services Reorganization: Goals

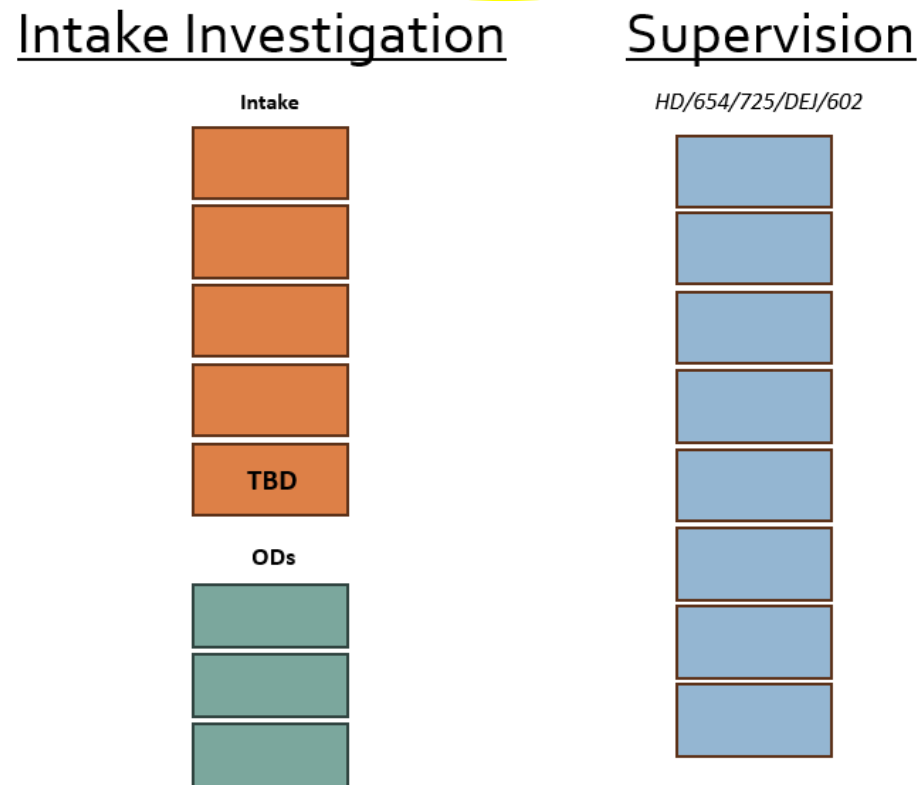
- Address concerns raised since current model launched in 2023.
- Reduce transitions for youth, families & partners.
- Improve SPO ability to manage caseloads and coverage across DPOs.
  - Larger pool of supervision DPOs = increased agility
  - Risk-based supervision will further optimize supervision caseloads
- Improve opportunities for peer support across DPOs.
- Reduce transitions for supervision staff.
- Recognize that home detention = community supervision.

## Model 1



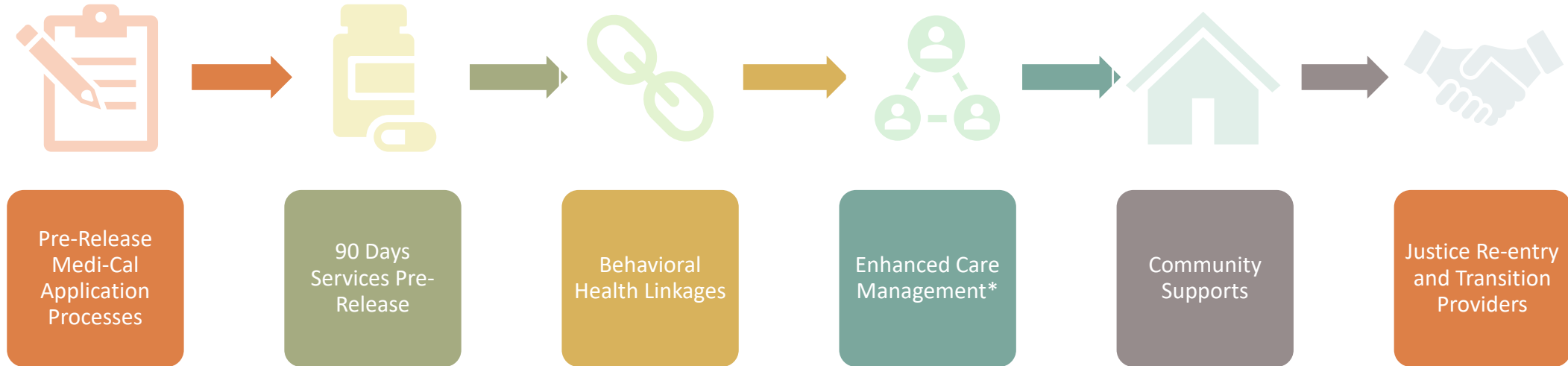

# CalAIM

- **California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM)** is a wide-ranging initiative to transform California's Medi-Cal program and to make it integrate more seamlessly with other social services.
- CalAIM is intended to help all Medi-Cal enrollees, with an emphasis on people with complex needs, including **justice-involved and child-welfare involved young people**.
- Many CalAIM activities, including the **Justice-Involved Initiative**, are facilitated by a federal Medicaid 1115 demonstration waiver.
- CalAIM is a significant opportunity to sustainably fund and augment services for justice involved young people – but it is also very complex (and requires Medi-Cal billing).

# CalAIM Justice-Involved Initiative



- In collaboration with HSA and SPY, JPD launched the first phase of CalAIM (Pre-Release Medi-Cal Application Processes) in Summer 2023.
- In order to launch the next phase, JPD was required to submit a Youth Correctional Facility **Readiness Assessment** to the state. DPH/SPY drafted the assessment, which was submitted on 7/1/25.
- JPD & SPY plan to begin providing pre-release services in April 2026.
- **CalAIM envisions that many services are provided by Community Based Organizations: they must be Medi-Cal certified, and they must contract with Managed Care Plans (Kaiser, Anthem, SFHP).**
- Managed Care Plans currently have juvenile justice contracts with: Alternative Family Services, Independent Living Systems, Nurturing Care LLC, Seneca Family of Agencies, St. Vincent Preventative Care, Unit Care Group, Inc., Bayview Hunter's Point Foundation, North East Medical Services, San Francisco Health Network, and Pacific Clinics.
