- We have launched an ongoing campaign to educate community members about new enrollment and redetermination processes, and are embarking on a new phase of the campaign due to HR 1 mandates
- Community health investments support programs and organizations addressing local health needs
- Continued partnership with the City and community organizations helps address health disparities and improve access to care



Community and Staff Voices Shaping the Future

- Hosted first community meeting on April 20 to hear directly from community, along with input from Kaiser Permanente leadership and clinical staff
- Decades of community participation through Kaiser Permanente's long standing Community Task Force
- Community engagement will be ongoing
- Engagement with frontline staff has been consistent and comprehensive
- 1200 attendees have attended meetings on new hospital design and operations and meetings are ongoing.



Vision for the Future

- Meet member and community medical needs for future decades
- Redevelop existing, partially vacant campus
- Construct state-of-the-art hospital with 301 licensed beds and facilities meeting modern needs, such as single occupancy rooms
- Hospital can be self-sufficient for up to 96 hours (72 hours is required by code)
- Transform hospital to all electric, low emission, low carbon system
- Retain and grow high quality medical and administrative roles and service jobs with competitive wages and benefits

Preparedness and Resilience



- **Built for disaster resilience:** The new hospital will provide care in a safer, more secure, and seismically sound environment, helping ensure patients can continue receiving care during earthquakes, natural disasters, and other large-scale emergencies.
- **Strong coordination with local emergency partners:** Kaiser Permanente works closely with the San Francisco Department of Public Health (SF DPH) through monthly Emergency Management Committee meetings, joint planning, trainings, and emergency preparedness exercises. The new hospital will further strengthen this coordinated response network.

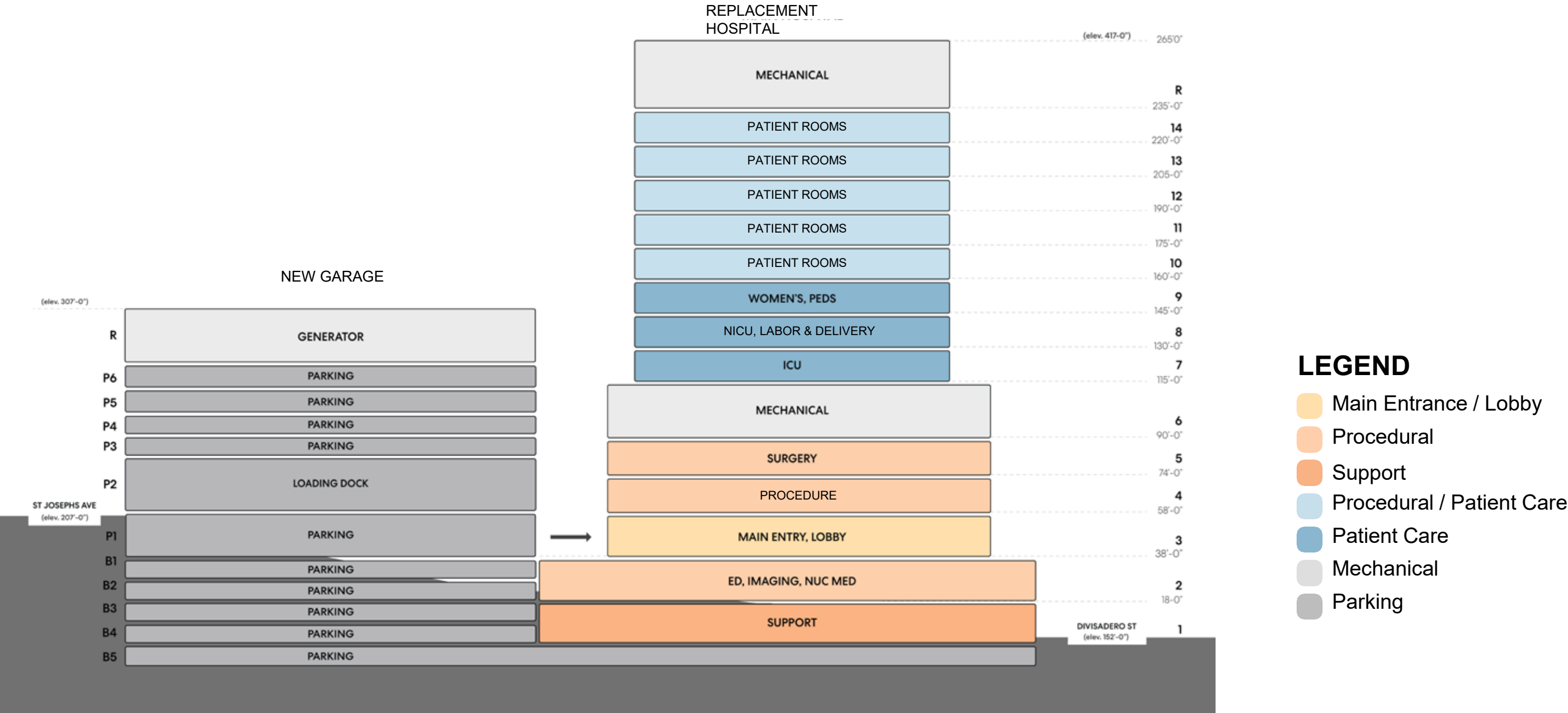

Access to Care

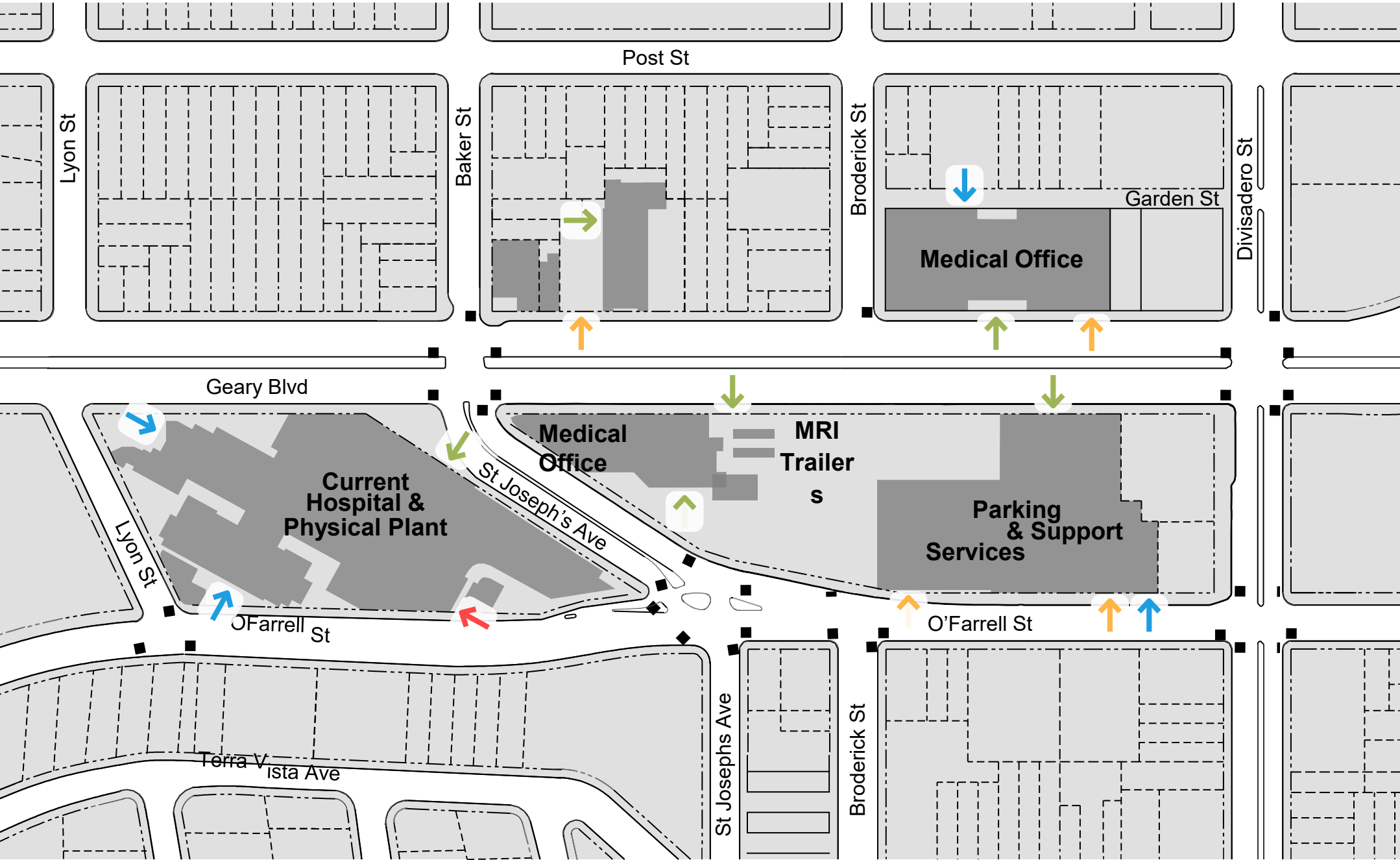


- Most Kaiser Permanente members get appointments as soon as, or sooner than, they expect. Over 80% of members typically get primary and specialty care appointments within 0-10 days.
- Outside Kaiser Permanente, people wait more than 23 days for a primary care appointment on average, and more than 30 days for many specialist visits.
- Our network mental health services includes more than 35,000 employed and contracted mental health providers across California, giving members more choice and helping us meet rising demand.
- Members receive non-urgent mental health appointments, on average, within about six days - better than the state requirement - and members with urgent needs can access appointments within 48 hours. Support is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week for anyone experiencing a crisis.
- The reduced slope of the new hospital entrance provides a more accessible arrival experience for older adults, people living with disabilities, and vulnerable patients, relative to the current Emergency Department entrance.

Proposed Replacement Hospital Design

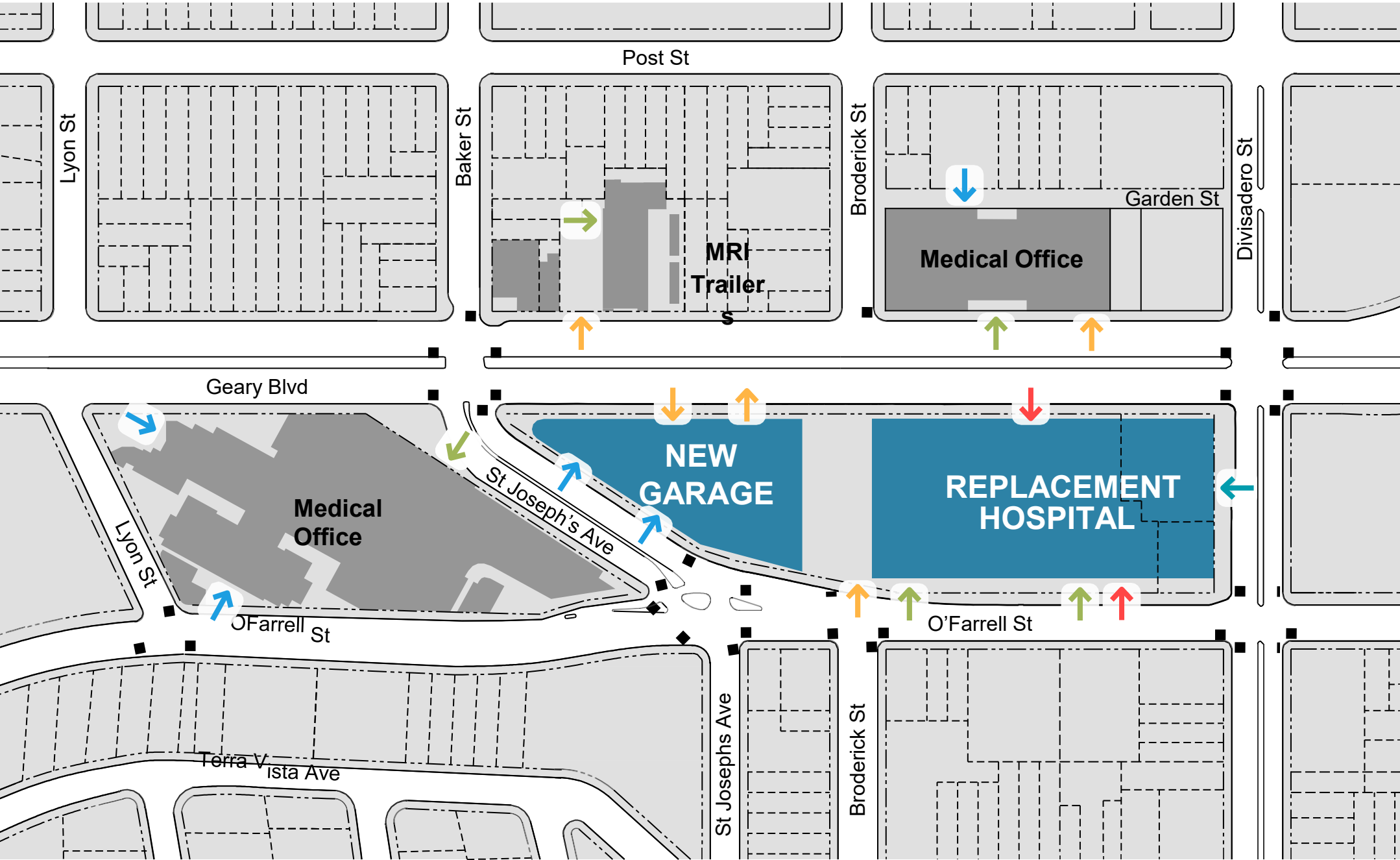


Existing Campus Site Map
