What's on the ballot?

For the November 3, 2026 Election, San Francisco voters will vote on federal, state, and local offices, including Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Board of Equalization Member, U.S. Representative, State Assembly Member, Supreme Court and Court of Appeal Justices, Assessor-Recorder, Public Defender, three seats on the San Francisco Board of Education, four seats on the Community College Board, and BART Director for District 8. Voters in Supervisorial Districts 2, 4, 6, 8, and 10 will also elect their Supervisor. The ballot will also include state, regional, and local measures.

What are my voting options?



1. Vote by Mail

In early October, the Department of Elections will send a vote-by-mail packet, with an official ballot, instructions, an "I Voted!" sticker, and a postage-paid return envelope to every locally registered voter. The online accessible vote-by-mail system — with screen readable ballots compatible with personal assistive devices — will also open to all voters at sfelections.gov/access.

Whether you use a paper or accessible ballot, you will need to complete three steps:

	Paper Vote-by-Mail Ballot	Accessible Vote-by-Mail Ballot
1 Mark your ballot	Read the instructions printed on your ballot before making your selections.	Go to sfelections.gov/access to access your ballot and read the online instructions before making your selections.
2 Prepare your envelope	Remove the receipt from the top of each ballot card and place the cards in the return envelope. Complete and sign the envelope, then seal it.	Print out your ballot and place it in the return envelope. Complete and sign the envelope, then seal it.
3 Return your envelope as soon as possible	✓ To be counted, ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than Election Day, November 3 and received by the Department of Elections no later than November 10. If mailing your ballot on Election Day, take it to a post office counter and request a "hand stamp" or "manual postmark." <i>Why? Mail dropped in a USPS collection box on Election Day may not be postmarked or picked up until the next day. A late postmark means your ballot cannot be counted.</i> ✓ To be counted, ballots returned in person must be hand-delivered to an official ballot drop box or a polling place by 8 p.m. on Election Day, November 3.	



The Department of Elections offers 37 official ballot drop boxes in neighborhoods across San Francisco. These boxes will be open 24 hours a day from October 5 through 8 p.m. on Election Day, November 3. For locations, visit sfelections.gov/dropboxes.



2. Vote Early at City Hall

The City Hall Voting Center will be open to all San Franciscans who wish to register to vote, vote in person, use accessible voting equipment, receive personal assistance, or return their mailed ballots:

- Weekdays, October 5–November 2 (except October 12, Indigenous Peoples' Day), from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Weekends, October 24–25 and October 31–November 1, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Election Day, Tuesday, November 3, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.



3. Vote at your Polling Place

Between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. on Election Day, 501 polling places will be open for in-person voting and ballot drop-off services. Over 2,000 poll workers, many of whom are bilingual, will be available to assist voters in their preferred language at polling places on Election Day. The address of your polling place, along with accessibility information, will be printed on the back cover of your Voter Information Pamphlet (mailed in October). You can also visit sfelections.gov/myvotinglocation to find your assigned polling place.
