Bill History and Background

SB 946 Safe Sidewalk Vending Act 2018

- Developed regulations to decriminalize street vending and moved responsibility of permitting away from police departments
- Unintentionally, SB946 —combined with COVID and other factors—created the conditions that led to the rise in fencing activity in San Francisco

Concerns over oversaturation with fencing and illegal activities led to advocacy from:

- Mission Community
- Merchants
- Mission Street Vendors Association
- Tenderloin Community
- Chinatown Community

Mission Street Vending Moratorium & Vending Restriction on Mission Street

- No vending on Mission St. from Cesar Chavez to 14th St
- Multi-departmental effort: DPW Director OEWD, DEM, D9, and SFPD
- Current order ends Jan 17, 2026
- Vending Pilot Program



What is CA SB 276

Purpose

 Address the criminal activity of fencing in San Francisco by allowing police to enforce violations related to unpermitted vendors selling stolen goods without permits, to support healthy street conditions

Legislative Partners

 Bill was crafted by Senator Wiener's office with support from the City and input from the Street Vending community and community stakeholders

List of Commonly Stolen Goods:

- State law allows SF to have a list of commonly stolen goods that if sold by unpermitted vendors can be enforced upon by the Police Department
- List excludes foods prepared on-sight and any prepackaged items (e.g., chips, nonalcoholic drinks) sold together with on-sight prepared food
- List does not apply to vendors who have a valid permit with DPW and can show proof of receipt
- List will need to be submitted annually to the Board of Supervisors



What is CA SB 276

Street Vending Permit Costs

• Caps permit fees annually at \$25 for applicants earning less the 200% of median income and or receives public benefits (e.g., CalWORKS, Cal Fresh, WIC)

Protections for Applicants

- Permitting departments cannot inquire or collect information around immigration status or citizenship
- Permitting departments cannot inquire or collect information regarding criminal history, require fingerprinting, or submit a background check as part of receiving a permit to vend.

Compliance

 1st three violations within 18 months are a citation, afterwards an individual can be given a misdemeanor charge

By January 1 each year, the permitting agency must submit a report to:

- The Board of Supervisors (City & County of San Francisco)
- Relevant legislative committees

Duration

Bill Sunsets January 1, 2031



Next Steps for Local Adoption

Governor's Signature

Awaiting Governor Newsom's approval

Required Community Engagement + Public Awareness

- 60 days prior: Host sessions with Vendor Associations, Mission District, TL-Midmarket, Chinatown, merchant groups & other community to inform about local ordinance
- 30 days prior: Launch media campaign to inform the public

Data Collection

Compile list of commonly stolen goods from DPW & SFPD data

Legislation Drafting

Coordination across departments

Implementation Goal

Legislation in place by Jan 1, 2026
