I. OVERVIEW

This overview is intended to assist applicants with the Request for Proposal ("RFP") process and introduce the focus of the Immigrant Community Capacity Building Grants. Please read this section carefully, along with the RFP, to determine whether your organization and proposed project align with the strategic goals and priorities of the program as outlined in this document. These goals and priorities, as well as each applicant's demonstrated expertise to achieve outcomes will be the basis upon which all funding decisions are made.

The Office of Civic Engagement & Immigrant Affairs ("OCEIA") is accepting proposals for specific Immigrant Community Capacity Building Projects, a competitive grant opportunity for nonprofit and community-based organizations based in the City & County of San Francisco ("the City") to plan and develop a set of programs and services for immigrant families in San Francisco. These grant opportunities will focus on supporting specific vulnerable immigrant populations and building capacity of targeted local immigrant communities. The program will provide approximately \$330,000 annually in grants across three areas:

1. Immigrant Gardening and Leadership Development Project

2. Forensic Medical and Psychological Evaluations for Immigrants

Applications are due by 5:00 p.m. PT on Monday, October 17, 2022.

The RFP process will select San Francisco non-profit/community-based organizations ("CBOs") and/or a collaborative with access to and expertise in one or more of the identified project priority areas.

All program activities must be conducted in San Francisco and will be focused on, but not limited to, specific at-risk or targeted communities as defined below.

Applicants should propose activities that leverage their own ability to reach and motivate targeted populations while employing street-smart, relevant, and creative approaches.

Selected applicants must demonstrate the cultural and linguistic competence, credibility, and capacity to reach, assist, and motivate targeted populations and communities to action. As determined by OCEIA, selected applicants must coordinate closely with the City and other program partners to achieve outcomes that will benefit targeted populations and all San Francisco residents.

Costs incurred by applicants in responding to this RFP are entirely the responsibility of the applicants and will not be reimbursed.

All questions regarding this RFP must be submitted by **5:00 p.m. PT on Tuesday, October 11, 2022** and will be posted at OCEIA's website https://sf.gov/oceiagrants, by 5:00 p.m. PT on Wednesday, October 12, 2022. OCEIA will not respond to questions submitted after the above deadline. Questions may be emailed to civic.engagement@sfgov.org. **To ensure that all applicants have access to the same information, OCEIA staff members are not permitted to answer RFP content questions via telephone or in person.**

All proposals must be submitted electronically in Microsoft Word or PDF format to civic.engagement@sfgov.org and received by OCEIA no later than **5:00 p.m. PT on Monday, October 17, 2022.** An email response will be sent within 24 hours to confirm receipt of completed proposals submitted on time.

Applicants to this program bear the sole responsibility for ensuring that all submitted proposals, including attachments and application forms, are complete, accurate, and received on time. Incomplete proposals or proposals sent after 5:00 p.m. PT on the due date or thereafter will not be accepted — no exceptions.

This grant will support the operations of garden projects and must also advance the goals of building community capacity and resiliency during the COVID-19 pandemic by establishing mutual aid; enhancing healthy food access; growing immigrant community leadership; teaching urban farming methods; and forming/expanding mechanisms for immigrant civic engagement.

Proposers for all programs must be 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations based in the City and County of San Francisco (the City). Program activities must be conducted in San Francisco and will be focused on assisting individuals who live, work, or attend school in the City. Selected grantees must be City-compliant vendors that demonstrate cultural and linguistic competence; have a history of assisting and serving San Francisco communities; demonstrate extensive knowledge of neighborhood services, issues, and resources; and demonstrate credibility and capacity to reach target populations.

IV. REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS #2022-02 IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY CAPACITY BUILDING GRANTS

General terms used in this RFP:

"Applicant" refers to any entity submitting a proposal to this Request for Proposals ("RFP"). "Grantee" refers to the applicant awarded an agreement for services under this RFP. "City" refers to the City and County of San Francisco. The Office of Civic Engagement & Immigrant Affairs ("OCEIA"), a division of the City Administrator's Office/General Services Agency ("CAO/GSA"), is the authorized City department responsible for overseeing all Language Access programs and grants.

For the purposes of this program, the term "Hard-to-Reach ("HTR") populations" refers to individuals that are Limited English Proficient ("LEP"); individuals with low levels of literacy or formal education; and groups that are least likely to respond to mainstream English-language communications and media.

A. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

OCEIA is a policy, compliance, direct services, and grant-making office that promotes civic participation and inclusive policies to improve the lives of San Francisco's residents, particularly immigrants, newcomers, underserved, and vulnerable communities. OCEIA seeks to bridge cultural, linguistic, and economic barriers to ensure that San Francisco's diverse residents have equal access to City services and opportunities to participate and contribute in meaningful ways to the success of the community and to the City.

OCEIA's integrated civic engagement and immigrant assistance programs involve out-of-the-box, street-smart, relevant and creative approaches to engage, inform, and mobilize the public, and ensure equity, inclusion, and meaningful civic participation. Specifically, OCEIA directs programs that assist immigrants and their families, including citizenship, affirmative relief programs, civic participation, community capacity, and language access. In addition, as the Citywide monitoring and compliance office for language access and services, OCEIA also provides technical assistance, training and direct language services support to City and community agencies.

OCEIA's integrated community grants are a natural extension of OCEIA's ongoing efforts to ensure that San Francisco's immigrant residents and newcomers are able to access the comprehensive range of protections and opportunities currently available to them, and to support the integration and empowerment of immigrant youth and families. OCEIA's grant opportunities focus on supporting specific vulnerable immigrant populations and building capacity of targeted local immigrant communities, in specific areas of the City, including the Southeast neighborhoods (Bayview, Sunnydale, Visitacion Valley), Excelsior, Outer Mission, OMI (Oceanview, Merced, and Ingleside), and near sites for gardening projects. Potential applicants are encouraged to carefully read all eligibility and program requirements before applying.

B. IMMIGRANT COMMUNITY CAPACITY BUILDING GRANTS – PURPOSE AND CATEGORIES

The Immigrant Community Capacity Building Grants are a natural extension of OCEIA's ongoing efforts to ensure that San Francisco's immigrant residents and newcomers are able to access the comprehensive range of services and opportunities currently available to them, and to support the integration of immigrants and their families. The funding opportunities listed in this RFP are part of an integrated set of immigrant assistance programs that include civic participation, leadership development, capacity building, healthy communities, and access to critical resources.

Grant Program Overall Priorities

- Work with OCEIA and grantee collaborative partners to align and implement specific, measurable projects that facilitate service delivery, meaningful engagement and improve the lives of immigrants and LEP individuals in San Francisco.
- 2. Expand access to, and knowledge of, resources, services and programs for immigrant families, including: immigration legal services and immigration petitions, immigrant rights, public benefits and social programs (food, employment, health, housing etc.), family support services and childcare, language access and English-acquisition services, health and wellness services, workforce development programs, and other stabilizing resources including COVID-19 relief.
- 3. Identify and develop effective approaches for informing and educating the immigrant community and general public about current immigrant assistance programs and opportunities for success and empowerment.
- 4. Create multilingual outreach and education strategies tailored to the needs of historically underserved and hard-to-reach immigrant communities in San Francisco and promote full, meaningful and inclusive participation;
- 5. Provide ongoing support for the educational, economic, social, and civic integration of immigrant residents and families.

C. ELIGIBILITY AND USE OF FUNDS

The Immigrant Community Capacity Building Grants RFP process is open to all San Francisco-based non-profit 501(c) (3) organizations that wish to implement projects as outlined in this RFP. To be eligible for a grant, proposed projects must:

- ✓ Be located in San Francisco with all major activities taking place in San Francisco.
- ✓ Serve the targeted populations in San Francisco (residents or individuals who live, work or attend school in the City).
- ✓ Must be a 501(C)(3) non-profit corporation registered with the Internal Revenue Service; and must be in good standing with the State of California's Registry of Charitable Trusts.
- ✓ Demonstrate that staff performing the work have cultural and linguistic competency in reaching and engaging the targeted populations.
- ✓ Demonstrate a long-term benefit to the identified San Francisco populations and City.
- ✓ Provide a time-bound schedule of when activities will occur.
- ✓ Demonstrate organizational capacity, history and track record of successfully providing the activities and services within the proposed category.
- ✓ Propose achievable goals, specific activities and measurable objectives.
- ✓ Be willing to work as a collaborative with other grantees and OCEIA.
- ✓ Utilize standardized procedures, processes and tools as designated by OCEIA.

Compliant City Supplier

All Applicants, or their fiscal sponsors, must be compliant City Suppliers in order to be eligible for funding. All proposals will be screened prior to the review process and non-compliant organizations will not be considered. Applicants Representing a Collaborative

Applicants representing a collaborative must have an existing written agreement or evidence of a prior coalition relationship with each collaborative member, in addition to demonstrating a successful track record of performing work as described in this RFP. A single application from the lead agency or fiscal sponsor must be submitted. OCEIA may require additional documentation and forms from each of the collaborative members at a later time. The lead agency or fiscal sponsor will be responsible for collecting and providing any and all documents as requested by OCEIA.

Note: Successful applicants will be required to execute and meet the provisions of a grant agreement. Additional documentation, including an annual work plan and an annual budget, must be completed and approved by OCEIA prior to any funds being committed or spent. Financing is based on a schedule to be determined by OCEIA. Successful applicants will be expected to participate in all OCEIA joint activities and financial/data reporting systems. Expenses incurred prior to start of the contract are not eligible for reimbursement.

The use of City funds is subject to numerous local requirements. A few of the requirements are listed below and are briefly summarized.

- ✓ Accessibility: programs and services must be accessible to persons with disabilities. Program access can be achieved in many cases without having to alter the existing facility.
- ✓ **Non-Discrimination:** agencies must comply with federal, state and San Francisco prohibitions against discrimination in fair housing and equal employment opportunity, and in awarding contracts. Agencies must also comply with the Equal Benefits Ordinance for domestic partners.
- ✓ **Procurement:** projects must comply with federal conflict of interest regulations, and regulatory procedures for obtaining and contracting for goods and services.
- ✓ **Ineligible Reimbursements:** funds for activities occurring prior to the commencement date of the grant agreement cannot be reimbursed.
- √ Religious Activity: funds may not be used for religious purposes or for the improvements
 of property owned by religious entities except where the grant recipient is a secular nonprofit organization with a long-term lease.
- ✓ **Political Activity:** funds may not be used for political activity.

D. REVIEW PROCESS, SCHEDULE AND SELECTION CRITIERIA

All submitted proposals will be initially screened by OCEIA staff to determine completeness and eligibility. Incomplete or ineligible proposals will not be considered. Evaluation and rating of eligible proposals will be conducted by a committee of OCEIA and City staff and/or philanthropic foundation grant makers. Please see the schedule outlined in Section III for specific dates and times.

Applicants selected for contract negotiations are not guaranteed a contract. The selection of any applicant for contract negotiations shall not imply acceptance by the City of all terms of the proposal, which may be subject to further negotiation and approvals before the City may be legally bound.

E. PROTEST PROCEDURES

Protest of Non-Responsiveness Determination

Within five business days of the City's issuance of a notice of non-responsiveness, any respondent that has submitted a proposal and believes that the City has incorrectly determined that its proposal is non-responsive may submit a written notice of protest. Such notice of protest must be received by the City on or before the fifth business day following the City's issuance of the notice of non-responsiveness. The notice of protest must include a written statement specifying in detail each and every one of the grounds asserted for the protest. The protest must be signed by an individual authorized to represent the respondent, and must cite the law, rule, local ordinance, procedure or RFP provision on which the protest is based. In addition, the protestor must specify facts and evidence sufficient for the City to determine the validity of the protest.

Protest of Grant Award

Any applicant that has submitted a responsive proposal and believes that the City has incorrectly selected another proposer for award may submit a written notice of protest by mail or e-mail (fax is not acceptable). Such notice of protest must be received by the City on or before 5:00pm PT Friday, October 28, 2022. The notice of protest must include a written statement specifying in detail each and every one of the grounds asserted for the protest. The protest must be signed by an individual authorized to represent the proposer, and must cite the law, rule, local ordinance, procedure or RFP provision on which the protest is based. In addition, the protestor must specify facts and evidence sufficient for the City to determine the validity of the protest.

Delivery of Protests

All protests must be received by 5:00 p.m. PT on Friday, October 28, 2022. If a protest is mailed, the protestor bears the risk of non-delivery within the deadlines specified herein. Protests should be transmitted by a means that will objectively establish the date the City received the protest. Protests or notice of protests made orally (e.g., by telephone) or by fax will not be considered. Protests must be delivered to:

Proposed work plans are subject to final approval by OCEIA during contract negotiations and successful applicants may be asked to change details of their proposed plans.
