About RFP #234

In October 2025, the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD) issued RFP 234 to solicit proposals across three divisions: Community Economic Development (CED), Workforce Development, and the Office of Small Business (OSB). This solicitation advances programs that strengthen San Francisco's economy, support small businesses, expand workforce opportunities, and foster equitable neighborhood growth.

Program Areas Covered by RFP 234

Applicants may propose under twelve program areas across OEWD's divisions:

Program Area A: ScaleUp SF: Training Program for the Growth of Small Businesses in San Francisco (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 7 or more

\$214,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$1,500,000 per year, with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$9 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: City-wide

Priority Population(s): Small business owners and entrepreneurs

Eligible Applicants: Nonprofits in good standing with at least 3 years of small business support experience

Who this Program Serves:

Existing San Francisco-based businesses that have:

- Operated for at least two years with steady sales
- Capacity to hire additional staff to support growth
- Participated in one of OEWD's business start-up programs within the last three fiscal years

Who Will Be Funded:

7 or more nonprofit organizations with demonstrated capacity to provide specialized business development support.

Core Service Areas & Program Model

Program Overview: Each funded organization will serve as a subject matter expert in one of six business development areas and collaborate to deliver citywide small business growth programming.

Core Service Areas

1. Business Coaching & Client Onboarding – Assess strengths and weaknesses to prepare growth plans.	4. Branding & Marketing – Develop marketing and branding strategies.
2. Business Strategy Development – Develop and refine growth strategies.	5. Digital Promotion & Web Development – Enhance online presence and marketing tools.
3. Financial & Accounting Coaching – Provide financial management, tax, and lending guidance.	6. Legal & Leasing Support – Support with lease negotiations, legal readiness, and compliance.

Collaborative Model:

- All 7 grantees will deliver technical assistance and participate in regular peer collaboration meetings.
- Each organization contributes to a shared "Action Plan" outlining growth tasks, including sustainability strategies, hiring plans, financial forecasting, and digital presence.
- OEWD expects grantees to hire qualified contractors/subject-matter experts and maintain compliance with state registration and Attorney General requirements.

Service Area Selection Process

- Applicant shall submit one Proposal per Core Service Area, up to a maximum of three (3) submissions.
- 2. Qualified Applicants will only be awarded in one (1) Cores Service Area based on score.
- 3. Should an Applicant be the top scorer for multiple Core Service Areas, then OEWD reserves the sole discretion to determine which Proposal will be awarded to the Applicant. OEWD will award the next highest scoring Proposal for the other Core Service Areas not awarded to such Applicant.



Program Area B: Community Benefit District – Technical Support (Professional Services Contract)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more \$155,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$155,000 for one year of services, with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$930,000 in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s) or Eligible Applicants: Contractors/Consultants who provide direct support to Community Benefit Districts or Business Improvement Districts.

- Provide as-needed technical support to existing and prospective Community Benefit District portfolio.
- Assist OEWD Team with formation, renewal, assessment management, and governance.
- Offer trainings for CBD staff on compliance, budgeting, and community engagement.
- Support OEWD Team with data collection and evaluation of district performance.



Program Area C: Citywide Business Outreach and Strengthening Targeting Spanish-language Businesses (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

\$300,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$300,000 for services.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide for services provided but must have offices in both the Mission and Excelsior neighborhoods.

Priority Population(s): Spanish-speaking small business owners.

Physical Location: San Francisco's Mission and Excelsior neighborhoods.

- Provide technical assistance and outreach to Latinx/Spanish-speaking businesses.
- Facilitate access to City resources and compliance support.
- Offer workshops and multilingual business navigation services.
- Conduct corridor activation and business networking events.
- Conducting and coordinating activities that complement and enhance existing efforts that support activities that celebrate the areas unique offerings while spurring economic activity.



Program Area D: Technical Assistance to Small Businesses in Low-Moderate Income Neighborhoods (18B HUD Matrix Code) (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 7 or more \$200,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$200,000 per year, with an option to extend up to four years of services, not to exceed \$800,000 in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: San Francisco Bayview, Chinatown, Mission, Tenderloin, Western Addition, South of Market (SoMa), Excelsior neighborhoods.

Priority Population(s): Small businesses, micro-enterprises, and low-moderate income entrepreneurs

- Deliver one-on-one business advising, workshops, and group trainings
- Support access to capital, permits, and lease negotiations.
- Coordinate neighborhood-based entrepreneur support.
- Track business performance and stabilization outcomes.



Program Area E: Small Business and Commercial Property Owner Legal Support Services (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

\$250,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$250,000 per year, with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$1.5 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): Small businesses and property owners.

- Provide legal advice on leasing, contracts, and disputes.
- Develop templates and educational materials on tenant rights.
- Offer direct support for lease negotiations and commercial stability.
- Coordinate with City partners to strengthen legal resources for small firms.



Program Area F: Citywide Business Outreach and Strengthening Targeting Chinese-Language Businesses (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

\$300,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$300,000 per year, with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$1.8 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): Chinese-speaking small business owners.

- Engage with Chinese speaking small businesses and provide technical assistance and referrals.
- Strengthen community ties by fostering collaboration among stakeholders, small business owners, and city agencies.
- Recruit and grow businesses in key sectors aligned with community goals.
- Organize events and activations to boost foot traffic and commercial activity.



Program Area G: Mission Street Food Incubator and Kitchen Capacity Program (Grant)

Maximum Funding Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

\$300,000 (1 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$300,000 per year, with the potential for multi-year funding contingent upon availability.

Eligible Neighborhoods: San Francisco's Mission District.

Priority Population(s): Culinary entrepreneurs, street vendors, and food producers.

Physical Location: San Francisco's Mission District.

- Provide access to permitted commissary kitchen space compliant with Planning Code and DPH requirements.
- Recruit and support food microentrepreneurs and street vendors along the Mission Street corridor.
- Deliver technical assistance and training on business launch, site identification, operations, and state and local compliance.
- Offer workshops and one-on-one coaching on business planning, marketing, and food vendor permitting.
- Identify compliant CMFO push carts and track measurable outcomes on business launches and arowth.

About OEWD'S Workforce Development Division

The Workforce Development Division of OEWD trains and connects San Franciscans to sustainable jobs with career growth opportunities. The division promotes economic prosperity for all residents, including unemployed, underemployed, and those facing barriers to employment.

The Workforce Division partners with employers, training providers, and community organizations to create equitable pipelines into San Francisco's key industries—construction, health care, hospitality, technology, etc.

The Workforce Development Division focuses on:

- · Training Pipelines: Preparing residents for in-demand careers through targeted training and skill development.
- Employer Partnerships: Connecting businesses with qualified job seekers.
- Supportive Services: Addressing barriers to employment with wraparound supports such as job readiness and case management.
- Equity & Access: Ensuring historically underserved populations gain entry to sustainable, living-wage careers.

Program Area H: Public Safety Academy (Grant)

Maximum Budget Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 2 or more \$1,600,000 (2 years)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to annually allocate \$2,300,000 (up to 2 years), with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$6.9 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: City-wide

Priority Population(s): Unemployed or underemployed San Francisco residents seeking public-safety careers.

Physical Location: San Francisco

- Offer multiple entry points into the workforce across emergency response, community health, mental and behavioral health, security, and other areas.
- Provide training and certification in occupations such as Emergency Medical Technician, Safety Dispatcher, Community Health Worker, Security Guard or Officer, Peer Mental Health Counselor or Behavioral Health Clinician, and other public safety sector occupations.
- Develop career pathways and employment placement services.
- Partner with public agencies and training institutions.
- Collect data on participant employment and certifications.



Program Area I: Industries of Opportunity - Arts and Entertainment (Grant)

Maximum Budget Request (per applicant): \$350,000 (2 years)

Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to annually allocate \$350,000 (up to 2 years), with an option to up to six years of services, not to exceed \$1.05 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): Artists and creative agents

Physical Location: San Francisco

- Support training and employment in arts, entertainment, and cultural industries.
- Provide career pathways and capacity building for creative entrepreneurs.
- Offer production, marketing, and planning support for organizations rooted in historically underrepresented communities and building career pathways that sustain the City's cultural identity.
- Incorporate culturally responsive curriculum that provides industry-recognized credentials or certifications, competitive wages, transferrable skills, and employer engagement.



Program Area J: Industries of Opportunity – Education (Grant)

Maximum Budget Request (per applicant): Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more \$600,000 (2 years)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to annually allocate \$600,000 (up to 2 years), with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$1.8 million in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): San Francisco high school graduates pursuing postsecondary education, particularly from high-need neighborhoods, who require financial and academic support to complete their studies and transition into the workforce.

Physical Location: San Francisco

- Support students to complete postsecondary education and work experience such as additional financial information, incentives or stipends, and career planning
- Provide comprehensive wrap-around financial and educational services such as workshops, trainings, educational seminars, coaching
- Develop career pathways and certification support.
- Collaborate with schools and training providers.



Program Area K: Industries of Opportunity – Urban Agriculture (Grant)

Maximum Budget Request: \$250,000 (2 years) Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to annually allocate \$250,000 (up to 2 years), with an option to extend up to six years of services, not to exceed \$750,000 in total.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): Unemployed or underemployed San Francisco residents seeking urban agriculture careers.

Physical Location: San Francisco

- Provide training and job placement in urban agriculture in areas such as cannabis and food systems.
- Support business development and job placement for urban growers, distribution sites, manufacturing, and retail.
- Develop career pathways and certification support.
- Incorporate targeted curriculum that provides industry-recognized credentials or certifications, competitive wages, transferrable skills, and employer engagement.



About OEWD'S - San Francisco Office of Small Business (OSB)

The San Francisco Office of Small Business (OSB), a division within the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), serves as the City's central resource for small businesses—providing direct services, advocacy, and policy leadership to ensure that entrepreneurs can start, operate, and thrive in San Francisco.

As the City's Small Business Assistance Center, OSB connects new and existing business owners to guidance, resources, and programs to strengthen San Francisco's commercial corridors and economic vitality.

OSB Provides support In:

- Business Counseling Providing support with local, state, and federal requirements; connect entrepreneurs to available resources; and provide general guidance for any small business needs.
- Leasing support Support business owners search for a space to open a new business or relocate; review lease agreements; and provide advisement in Letter of Intent and lease negotiations.

Program Area L: Manufacture of Legacy Business Brushed-Aluminum Plaques (Professional Services Contract)

Maximum Budget Request (per applicant):

Anticipated # of Awards: 1

\$50,000 (4 year)

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate \$12,500 per year, totaling \$50,000 for four years of services.

Eligible Neighborhoods: Citywide

Priority Population(s): Legacy business community.

- Confirm that the material and installation options for the brushed-aluminum plaques are feasible and ideal; provide alternatives if necessary.
- In Adobe Illustrator, make one minor edit to the plaque text.
- In Adobe Illustrator, add business information to each plaque to be provided prior to manufacture.
- Manufacture, or work with a foundry to manufacture, the plaques.
- Deliver the manufactured plaques to OEWD; also, provide threaded studs and epoxy for mounting.



First become a Registered Bidder...

The first step to begin working with the City is to <u>complete a short registration process</u> to become a "Registered Bidder". This will allow you to view and bid on Sourcing Events.

...then Become an Approved Supplier

After becoming a Registered Bidder, you can then advance your status to become an Approved Supplier, which allows you to be fully awarded City contracts. The steps to do this are as follows:

- 1 Complete a San Francisco Business Tax Registration
- 2 Complete a 12B Equal Benefits Declaration





Search the Files of the Registry of Charitable Trusts

The Registry Search Tool allows you to query the Registry's database and verify whether a charitable organization or fundraiser has compiled with the Attorney General's registration and reporting requirements. You may also review and download records and public filings that a charitable organization or fundraiser has submitted to the Attorney General's Registry of Charitable Trusts. This includes copies of annual registration renewal forms (Form RRF-1), IRS Forms 990, raffle reports and fundraising reports that are in the Registry's database. Information is retrieved from the database in real-time but data and statuses may change intrady as fillings are processed.

WHAT IS THE FIRST SOURCE HIRING PROGRAM?

- The First Source Hiring Program was enacted into law in 1998 as Chapter 83 of the SF Administrative Code and amended in 2009
- Requires covered employers to make good faith efforts toward employing economically disadvantaged San Francisco residents for entry level positions on applicable projects
- The San Francisco Workforce Development system provides supply of qualified workers to employers with hiring needs, and gives economically disadvantaged individuals the opportunity to apply for entry-level jobs in San Francisco





WHAT IS THE FIRST SOURCE HIRING PROGRAM?

COVERED EMPLOYERS

- All businesses with City contracts for goods, services, grants or loans in excess of \$50,000 (or in excess of \$350,000 for construction contracts)
- Employers engaged in commercial activity in over 25,000 square feet space that involved new construction, an addition, or alteration after April 2001 and resulted in the expansion of entry level positions
- Businesses who have leases on City property





HOW DOES FIRST SOURCE HIRING WORK?

- First Source applies to entry level positions that require less than two years of experience
- Covered employers submit entry level job descriptions to OEWD's First Source Hiring Program team by submitting a <u>First Source Workforce</u> <u>Projection Form</u> for every applicable contract
- First Source positions are promoted across OEWD's network of community and educational partners
- OEWD and partners pre-screen applicants to refer qualified candidates to employers
- Employers make a good faith effort to hire First Source candidates



5 STEP PROCESS

- Complete/submit a <u>First Source Workforce Projection Form</u> of entry-level positions
- 2. Register as a First Source Employer with WorkforceLinkSF
- 3. Create and submit a job order which includes basic qualifications, wage rate, benefits etc.
- 4. Make a "good faith effort" to interview and hire referrals from the City's workforce development system.
- 5. Submit verification of any hires made with your designated First Source Hiring Specialist.

- Use streets in San Francisco for business purposes for any part of seven (7) days during the tax year.
- Have more than \$500,000 in total gross receipts allocated to the City during the tax year.

If the Office of The Treasurer & Tax Collector determines that I am conducting business in San Francisco, the City may either cancel the contract or withhold payment ten days after written notification by the Tax Collector. I declare (or certify) under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the foregoing is true and correct, and that I am authorized to bind this entity contractually.



Requirement Before Contracting: Equal Benefits Compliance

What is the Equal Benefits Ordinance, Articles 131 & 132 Labor and Employment Code? (Formerly known as 12B)

Equal Benefits is a social policy that requires City contractors to provide equal treatment for employer sponsored health and well-being benefits.

City requires Equal Benefits compliance for contracts.

What Are The Employer Requirements?

If benefits are provided then:

- Employees who are in a domestic partnership are treated the same as married employees in/or related to employee benefits.
- Employees are given the option to add a spouse or domestic partner to employer sponsored benefits when available.
- Proof of relationship/waiting period requirements are applied the same for employees that are married or in a domestic partnership.

How do I complete Equal Benefits compliance?



1. Start at link Comply with the Equal Benefits Program | SF.gov



- 2) Gather and submit the 3 compliance documents
 - The total number of employees in U.S.
 - Proof of employee count (IRS 941 or W-3)
 - Provide a Memorandum that summarizes employee benefits.



3) Complete online declaration

What if - I do not provide benefits, have zero-employees, or my employees have no partner/spouse – what do I do?

Compliance is required of all firms. However, documenting compliance for a firm in this situation is simpler. For example: if you:

Do not provide benefits:

On Declaration respond to question 2A and 2B with "No"

Have zero employees, provide:

- IRS Form 1040 Schedule SE- Individuals
 or
- Self Certification more information contact CMD at cmd.equalbenefits@sfqov.orq

Have employees with no partner or spouse:

 Document that if employee marital/partnership status changes, they are still Equal Benefits compliant. This will be declared in the Memorandum to Employees.

Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO)

Covered Employer

- For-profit and nonprofit 5+ workers (permanent, temporary, etc.) anywhere in the world
- with a City contract
- subcontractors need to comply


- Anyone working for a covered employer on a City contract
- Working in the US

Time Off

Paid Time Off (PTO)

- 12 days (Accrual rate is 0.04615 hours)
- PTO is the property of the worker

Unpaid Time Off (UTO)

- 10 days (Accrual rate is 0.03846 hours)
- For use as unpaid sick time





Health Care Accountability Ordinance (HCAO)

Covered Employer

- For Profits have 20 or more workers in the world
- Non-Profits have 50 or more workers in the world
- Has a City Contract
 - If a nonprofit with a City Grant, then Exempt from HCAO but may need to comply with HCSO
- Subcontractors and subtenants need to comply





Health Care Accountability Ordinance (HCAO)

Covered Employee

 Anyone in the US who works at least 20 hours a week or more on a City Contract for services or on the leased property.

Keep in Mind:

• Work hours that fluctuate from week to week are Covered Employees if the average number of hours per week during applicable month is 20 hours or more.



When do I have to start complying?

Compliance must begin no later than the first of the month that begins after 30 days from the start of employment on a covered contract





HCAO Requirements 1/3

Option 1 - For all locations in the US



- Offer each covered employee a compliant health plan at no charge to the employee-no later than the first of the month after 30 days.
- A compliant health plan meets all of the HCAO Minimum Standards https://sf.gov/information/understand-health-care-accountability-ordinance

HCAO Requirements – 2/3

Option 2 - Only available for work performed in the City & County of San Francisco (CCSF), San Bruno Jail, or at SFO

Pay **HCAO Fee Rate** per employee, per hour to Department of Public Health (DPH), capped at 40 hours per week.

- 7/1/25 6/30/26: \$7.50, max cap \$300 per week
- Rate adjusted every July 1
- Pay to be in compliance not a benefit or \$ for worker

HCAO Requirements – 3/3

Option 3 – For work performed NOT in CCSF, SFO, or San Bruno Jail

Pay the HCAO fee amount directly to employee, capped at 40 hours per week

- 7/1/25 6/30/26: \$7.50, max cap \$300 per week
- Rate adjusted every July 1



Health Care Security Ordinance (HCSO)

Non-Profits

Grants to **NON-PROFITS** are **exempt** from <u>HCAO</u> but company may need to comply with <u>HCSO</u> -CCSF citywide labor law

For-Profits

Grants to FOR-PROFITS need to comply with HCAO and maybe HCSO

MCO and HCAO Declaration Forms

- To contract with the City and County of San Francisco, both the MCO and HCAO Declaration Forms are required for contracts that are \$25,000 or more.
- By completing the Declaration Forms, you are agreeing to comply with the ordinances when the ordinances apply to your firm
- A Department can not request a waiver or exemption for the Declaration requirement
