Dear Mayor Lurie, Chief Scott, and Members of the San Francisco Police Commission,

I am writing to urge the City and County of San Francisco — including the Mayor's Office, the Police Department, and the Police Commission — to reject or suspend acceptance of the recently announced \$1 million pledge from Salesforce for SFPD hiring bonuses until a full public review is conducted.

I want to be clear at the outset that I strongly support increasing police presence and more assertive law enforcement in San Francisco. I share many of the concerns Marc Benioff has raised about public safety in the city, and I believe a stronger policing posture is essential to restoring order and confidence.

However, Mr. Benioff's public advocacy for federalizing the National Guard to police San Francisco is profoundly different from — and incompatible with — legitimate law-enforcement goals. Such a proposal would plainly violate the Posse Comitatus Act and represents a dangerous erosion of one of the most fundamental constitutional boundaries in American life. Accepting public-safety funding from someone promoting unconstitutional solutions risks legitimizing those ideas and undermines public trust in the city's commitment to lawful policing.

I urge the City to:

- 1. Decline or postpone acceptance of Salesforce funding until a transparent review, including public input, is completed.
- 2. Require any future partnership to include a formal repudiation of Mr. Benioff's remarks about federalizing the National Guard.
- 3. Affirm that San Francisco will pursue strong, lawful, and accountable policing but will never accept or endorse unconstitutional methods to achieve it.

San Franciscans deserve public safety built on the rule of law, not on proposals that would undermine it.
