Emily is an artist and designer based in San Francisco whose work explores the emotional connections to place, particularly the in-between moments found in both familiar and unfamiliar settings. Drawing inspiration from her travels and daily wanderings, she captures fleeting, melancholic details that evoke a sense of wonder, mystery, and quiet contemplation. Her paintings blend vibrant colors, layered light, and subtle symbolism to create spaces that feel both grounded and dreamlike. Working primarily with watercolor and gouache, Emily embraces the unpredictable nature of these mediums, using each brushstroke as an opportunity for growth and exploration. Through her art, she invites viewers to reflect on the transient beauty of their surroundings and the often-overlooked moments that shape their understanding of the world. In addition to her paintings, Emily creates one-of-a-kind jewelry pieces using stones she ethically sources through rockhounding. Each stone is transformed through lapidary work and silversmithing, resulting in wearable art that highlights the unique character of the natural world.

I have a growing collection of materials for both my art practice and my jewelry making practice, which spens many months and years. I do not have a repository of all of my receipts. If needed I could gather a snapshot of expenses.

I prioritize safety in my craft by following best practices for handling materials and equipment. In my painting practice, I primarily use watercolor and gouache, which are non-toxic. For jewelry making, I take additional precautions when working with lapidary tools and silversmithing equipment. I wear safety goggles and a dust mask when cutting, grinding, or polishing stones to protect my eyes and lungs from debris. I also wear ear protection when using loud tools like a saw or grinding wheels. Chemicals, such as flux or patinas, are stored in clearly labeled containers and away from food or drink. I follow proper disposal procedures for hazardous materials and keep them out of reach of children and pets. By using safety equipment and properly storing and handling materials, I ensure a safe workspece and protect both myself and the environment.
