WISF Executive Committee Members Absent

Ohlone Land Acknowledgement, Announcements, & Housekeeping (Discussion Item) Jeanine Cotter, WISF Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:06 A.M. Secretary Seals-Jackson (OEWD) opened the meeting by reciting the Ohlone Land Acknowledgement and the meeting guidelines.

Roll Call (Discussion Item) Chair Cotter requested for Secretary Seals-Jackson to conduct roll call. Secretary Seals-Jackson took attendance, and quorum was achieved.

Chair's Welcome (Discussion Item) Chair Cotter welcomed the members and the general public who joined in person and on Zoom.

Adoption of Agenda for August 15, 2025 (Action Item) Chair Cotter called the Adoption of the Agenda for August 15, 2025 and requested comments from members. Seeing none, a motion to adopt the agenda was made by Member Rodriguez, seconded by Member Tapia, and passed unanimously.

Approval of Minutes from May 16, 2025 (Action Item) Chair Cotter called for the Approval of the Minutes from May 16, 2025. With no additional comments from members, a motion to approve the minutes was made by Member Lavery and seconded by Member Tapia. The motion passed unanimously.

Workforce Director's Report (Discussion Item) Chair Cotter called the Workforce Director's Report and asked the Director of Workforce Development at the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD), Iowayna Peña, to provide remarks.

Director Peña opened her report by providing current labor market updates, followed by key program developments and community engagement highlights. She noted that San Francisco's unemployment rate has remained relatively stable over the past year, generally between 3.5% and 4%. However, there was a slight uptick in June to 4.2%, marking the highest rate observed in recent months, though still far below the peaks seen during the COVID-19 pandemic. She also presented longer-term trends, citing data from July 2023.

Director Peña spotlighted the success of Enterprise for Youth's Summer Expo, which served young people this year through paid internships across City departments, artistic institutions, and private sector partners. She also introduced the 43rd cohort of the CityBuild program, which launched with 34 participants.

Additional highlights included the ninth cohort graduation of the City EMT program, which trained 24 aspiring EMTs and paramedics in collaboration with Dusty's Fishing Well. Director Peña also reported that OEWD staff, including the Employer Services and Community Engagement teams, recently participated in an EDD job fair, where they connected with over 100 job seekers and helped route them into the City's workforce system.

Director Peña addressed recent changes at Goodwill's San Francisco branch. OEWD assisted in negotiating a co-location arrangement at the San Francisco Public Library's main branch. While Goodwill's Post Street office has closed, services as a comprehensive job center are ongoing, and OEWD continues to monitor both their virtual service delivery and coordination with state partners.

Director Peña reported that OEWD received an increase in WIOA funding and was able to fund more service providers with WIOA funding, many of whom attended a recent orientation session alongside returning partners. The Workforce Programs and Workforce Impact teams are working closely with providers to ensure understanding of new compliance requirements, offering office hours and training support. Another session is planned in the coming weeks.

Director Peña also briefed the Committee on the department's ongoing development of the Citywide Workforce Development Plan. A recent meeting with Supervisor Walton, Alignment Committee co-chairs, and Mayor Lurie offered a valuable opportunity to highlight the integrated nature of San Francisco's workforce system. The Mayor expressed strong support and a desire to stay engaged with workforce development efforts, including private sector outreach and direct engagement at upcoming events.

Director Peña previewed the upcoming Youth Consortium scheduled for Thursday, October 2nd. The event is aimed at improving alignment among youth-serving providers and employer partners, with an emphasis on smoothing transitions from job training to job placement for transitional-age youth. She invited Committee members to attend and connect directly with these providers.

Lastly, she gave an update on the Bay Area Jobs First Activation Plan, highlighting OEWD's leadership in coordinating sector investment strategies across the region. Sector investment coordinators have been appointed to lead planning for five priority sectors: advanced manufacturing, battery manufacturing, early care and education, healthcare, and transportation electrification. These plans are designed to guide equitable workforce investment and promote climate-resilient economic growth. Director Peña acknowledged the heavy lift involved in convening representatives from nine Bay Area counties to keep the project on track while meeting state demands.

Director Peña concluded her report and invited questions from the Board.

Member Rodriguez requested that OEWD explore the possibility of producing a preliminary snapshot analysis of the artificial intelligence (AI) sector in San Francisco. Specifically, he asked for a report that identifies AI companies and related entities, both for-profit businesses and non-profits, operating within the City, including estimated year-over-year employment from 2023 to 2024, observable occupational trends, and a geolocation map of those entities. He emphasized that this information would be valuable for understanding sectoral trends and recommended leveraging tools such as those used by the Controller's Office and OEWD's existing mapping capabilities.

Member Rodriguez also inquired whether the Workforce Alignment Committee had discussed the potential implications of federal Medicaid (Medi-Cal) cuts, particularly with regard to workforce program eligibility. He suggested a deeper coordination between health and workforce systems to proactively identify Medi-Cal recipients who may become eligible for workforce services if benefits are lost. He asked if OEWD could map Medi-Cal recipient locations and trends, anticipating potential need for rapid response services during economic downturns.

Member Tapia responded that anyone with the right to work can already receive workforce services, regardless of employment status. He raised concerns about a perceived lack of enforcement in requiring benefit recipients to actively seek employment, particularly in contrast to the rigorous requirements enforced by EDD for unemployment insurance recipients. Member Tapia emphasized that simply enrolling in job services fulfills federal eligibility for ongoing benefits, and shared insight into the process, explaining that individuals applying for unemployment are automatically pre-enrolled in workforce services and must complete enrollment within 21 days to avoid benefit interruptions.

Member Rodriguez affirmed this alignment and noted that tracking Medi-Cal recipients' enrollment in workforce programs could help maintain their benefit eligibility, thereby functioning as an anti-poverty strategy. He encouraged further exploration of automated enrollment mechanisms and closer collaboration with the Mayor's Office and Department of Public Health.

Member Aiyer supported the idea and questioned whether such coordination is currently possible, particularly whether there are barriers to automatic enrollment for Medi-Cal recipients in workforce services. Director Peña and staff acknowledged that more information would be needed to determine the feasibility of auto-enrollment, and they committed to follow-up as appropriate.

Member Tapia provided an update on the recent EDD job fair, noting hundreds of attendees including veterans, over 20 employers, and OEWD connected with over 100 participants at its table.. He also asked about Goodwill's service delivery. Director Peña provided a update.

Member Tapia also requested an updated list of WIOA providers and asked for clarification on the referral process. Ms. Hand explained that referrals currently flow through Goodwill, which then connects job seekers to culturally congruent service providers. Should that process change, OEWD would notify partners accordingly so they can coordinate directly with new providers.

Member Lavery asked about the recent unemployment rate increase, the highest in a year, and whether it aligned with sectoral employment growth. Director Houston explained that labor force size, not just job counts, drives unemployment rates. A growing rate may indicate more people re-entering the labor market rather than job losses.

Member Lavery raised a question regarding the Citywide Workforce Development Plan. Director Peña regarded the Workforce Alignment Committee, a public body that includes representatives from City agencies, private employers, and community-based organizations. She confirmed that labor is represented on the committee, including members from San Francisco Building Trades.

In response to Member Lavery's concern about awareness of construction sector representation, Director Peña confirmed that committee materials and meeting notices are publicly accessible. She underscored that the Alignment Committee is an open, transparent process and encouraged members to participate. Member Rodriguez noted that the Alignment Committee was created via ordinance by the Board of Supervisors and functions as a statutory body.

Workforce Division Budget Update (Discussion Item)

Chair Cotter introduced agenda item seven, inviting Director Peña to provide an update on the OEWD Workforce Division budget. Director Peña shared that OEWD recently received its WIOA subgrant allocation of approximately \$6.8 million, which arrived four months late due to federal-level delays. Despite this, OEWD has managed to distribute funding memos to providers, ensuring program continuity. She emphasized the effort by the finance team to move quickly to have everything ready for full Board approval in September.

In response to a question from Member Aiyer, Director Peña confirmed the delays were entirely federal. Member Aiyer remarked on the political sensitivity of funding flows and noted the relative success in San Francisco's continued receipt of federal funds.

Director Peña previewed that OEWD's new Executive Director would attend the next WISF meeting to introduce herself and offer further insights into the Mayor's direction for workforce strategy.

Future Discussion Items (Action Item) Chair Cotter opened the floor for Board members to propose future discussion topics or presentation requests for upcoming WISF meetings.

Member Aiyer proposed that the City leverage its data to analyze the relationship between AI adoption and job loss or transformation. He noted growing national attention to this issue and suggested that OEWD could play a leadership role in tracking impacts at the local level. Director Peña noted recent engagement with the Mayor's Office of Civic Innovation, which is leading the City's broader technology overhaul. She uplifted exploring the possibility of a deeper workforce-AI impact study in coordination with that office.

In support, Member Rodriguez referenced a recent Washington Post analysis identifying 700 occupations that are either vulnerable to automation or subject to augmentation. He offered to share the report with the group and highlighted broader policy conversations unfolding across the country.

Chair Cotter raised questions about the inclusion of battery manufacturing in the Bay Area's Jobs First strategy. She questioned the practical demand and viability of battery manufacturing within San Francisco, noting that installation alone poses major logistical barriers and permit delays.

Ms. Hand explained that battery manufacturing was identified as a strategic priority at the state level. These sectors were then selected by the Bay Area Jobs First Steering Committee, which includes UC Berkeley, MTC/ABAG, labor representatives, and CBOs, and reflect broader statewide investment interests. She acknowledged that battery manufacturing is likely more relevant for the East Bay due to space and infrastructure availability.

Members shared concerns that prioritizing battery manufacturing regionally might not yield significant workforce development returns in San Francisco itself. Director Peña noted that workforce benefits may emerge indirectly, citing companies that operate in San Francisco while manufacturing elsewhere.

Director Peña added that the team is preparing for a major procurement process, with over 80 workforce programs to be re-competed early next year. She asked for the Committee's understanding as the team balances immediate needs with long-term planning.

Member Lavery recommended adopting an integrated calendar of all of the different tables OEWD sits on. Member Rodriguez asked whether the department had lost funding. Director Peña clarified that no programs were defunded or experienced layoffs due to OEWD's budget, and that any lost funding was due to provider performance, not budget shortfalls.

Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items (Discussion Item) Chair Cotter called for public comment on non-agenda items. Secretary Seals-Jackson informed the public on how to provide public comments in the meeting and on Zoom. There was no public comment in the room nor on Zoom.

Adjournment (Action Item) Chair Cotter expressed gratitude to all the attendees for their participation in the meeting and invited any member comments before proceeding with a vote to adjourn.

Receiving no further comments, Chair Cotter called for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Member Aiyer made the motion, which was seconded by Member Lavery and was unanimous. Members adjourned the meeting at 10:29 A.M.


